### LANCASTER CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING OF JULY 12, 2021

### Call to Order:

Mayor Hairston called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. on July 12, 2021.

#### **Invocation**:

Bishop Clyde C. Hairston of Miracle Temple Fellowship Church gave the invocation.

#### Pledge of Allegiance:

Councilmember Wheaton led the pledge of allegiance.

#### **Public Testimony:**

There were no speakers.

## **Consent:**

- 1. Consider an amendment to Ordinance No. 2020-09-31 amending the Lancaster Economic Development Corporation Fund (LEDC), the Lancaster Recreational Development Corporation Fund (LRDC), and the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.
- 2. M21-26 Consider a resolution authorizing the City Manager to execute a development agreement between the City of Lancaster and Longhorn Industrial Properties, LLC, a South Carolina limited liability company, related to the relocation of East Longhorn Drive which is situated in the M. Parks Survey, Abstract No. 1120, City of Lancaster, Dallas County, Texas.

3. Consider a resolution ratifying amendments to the Chapter 380 Economic Development Agreements between the City of Lancaster, Texas and Walmart Inc. to eliminate language from the signature blocks of both agreements.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Strain-Burk made a motion, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Hill to approve Consent items 1-3. The vote was cast 6 for, 0 against. [Mejia absent]

## **Public Hearing:**

4. Conduct a public hearing and consider an ordinance approving the land use assumptions, the capital improvement plans, and updated water, wastewater, and roadway impact fees.

City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that in November 2017, the City Council approved a professional services contract with Freese and Nichols, Inc. for the purpose of updating the Master Thoroughfare Plan, the Water and Wastewater Master Plan, as well as the impact fees. The most recent update of the impact fees was in 2012. As part of the impact fee program update, the Capital Improvement Advisory Committee (CIAC) also provided comments regarding land use assumptions, capital improvement plans, and impact fees. Additionally, on September 28, 2020, the City Council approved an ordinance adopting the Master Thoroughfare Plan. The City Council received its presentation of the Water and Wastewater Plan at its May 17, 2021, work session meeting. On June 28, 2021, the City Council approved an ordinance adopting the Water and Wastewater Master Plan. The Impact Fee Program serves as the financing mechanism to implement capital projects identified within the adopted Master Thoroughfare Plan and the Water and Wastewater Master Plan. Capital improvement plans identify a ten (10) year list of prioritized projects to be implemented from the Master Thoroughfare and the Water and Wastewater Master Plan that will add new capacity to the city's infrastructure system. Impact fees are one-time fees paid by new development and assist with off-setting the city's cost when implementing new roads, water and wastewater infrastructure project costs. City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that staff recommendation is being presented to City Council with an increase in fees beyond that of the CIAC recommendation. The proposed collection rate presented by staff is consistent with overall collection rate that is currently adopted. Further, staff's recommendation considered the growing number of new development, as well as, the increasing scale of the square footages of development. The staff recommendation seeks to increase the participation rate of the developer in order to implement the necessary road infrastructure improvements.

Mayor Hairston opened the public hearing. There were no speakers.

**MOTION:** Mayor Pro-Tem Hill made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Strain-Burk to close the public hearing. The vote was cast 6 for, 0 against. [Mejia absent]

**MOTION:** Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Jaglowski made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Strain-Burk to approve item 4 Exhibit B. The vote was cast 6 for, 0 against. [Mejia absent]

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### Action:

5. Discuss and consider a resolution of the City Council approving and accepting the terms and conditions of the Motorola Solutions, Inc. ("MOTOROLA") agreement.

City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that Project 25, or (P25) as undertaken and promoted by the Association of Public Safety Communication Officials (APCO), is the national standard for public safety digital radio. Having a P25 digital radio system will soon be a requirement as a prerequisite for the awarding of most federal and state grants. These systems promote interoperability, provide more frequencies to users, and are compatible with most vendors, regardless of the P25 system's infrastructure. The City of Lancaster public safety agencies; Police Department, Fire Department, Emergency Communications (E911) and Emergency Management functions are all connected to a ten-year-old analog radio system which is not P25 compliant. Additionally, City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that on June 21, 2021, City Council received a presentation regarding an upgrade to our Public Safety radio communication system. The City of Lancaster in cooperation with the Best Southwest Cities of Cedar Hill, DeSoto, and Duncanville have partnered together and bundled our purchase to ensure competitive pricing on the cooperative agreement through HGAC. Operations and implementation will be through an interlocal agreement with the City of Dallas and Dallas County. City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that staff recommends approval of the resolution, as presented.

**MOTION:** Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Jaglowski made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Strain-Burk to approve item 5 with corrections to the Mayor's name. The vote was cast 6 for, 0 against. [Mejia absent]

Mayor Hairston called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. on July 26, 2021.

## **Invocation**:

Bishop Clyde C. Hairston of Miracle Temple Fellowship Church gave the invocation.

#### Pledge of Allegiance:

Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Racheal Hill led the pledge of allegiance.

### **Public Testimony:**

Dori Lee, 211 N. Henry Street shared comments from Lancaster citizen, Monica Gill, recognizing the Police and Fire Departments quick, professional and courteous response during a neighborhood crisis.

Pastor Nathaniel Standifer, 733 Francis, shared information on his "Back to School Bash" for youth on August 7th, 2021.

## Consent:

- 1. Consider a resolution awarding RFP 2021-31 to Jack Pyland for the café commercial lease in the new terminal building at the Lancaster Regional Airport, 950 Ferris Road.
- 2. Consider a resolution awarding RFP 2021-37 to Knight Security Systems, Inc. (KSS) for the installation of an open option access control security system, in an amount not to exceed one hundred twenty-seven thousand, five hundred thirty-eight dollars and five cents (\$127,538.05) for the following city properties: Public Safety Building (100 Craig Shaw Memorial Parkway), Municipal Court (220 West Main Street), Fire Station #2 (3132 North Houston School Road), Veterans Memorial Library (1600 Veterans Memorial Parkway), Recreation Center (1700 Veterans Memorial Parkway), Senior Life Center (240 Veterans Memorial Parkway), Fleet Maintenance (631 East Third Street), Municipal Center (211 North Henry Street), Animal Shelter (690 East Main Street), 700 East Main Street, Lancaster Regional Airport (950 Ferris Road), James R. Williams Pump Station (1999 North Jefferson Street), and Fire Station #3 (1960 West Beltline Road).
- 3. Consider a resolution ratifying the terms and conditions of an asset transfer agreement between North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), STAR Transit (Transferring Agency), and the City of Lancaster (Receiving Agency) related to the transfer of a 2014 El Dorado Aerotech 240 vehicle from the transferring agency to the receiving agency.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Strain-Burk made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Gooden-Davis to approve Consent items 1-3. The vote was cast 7 for, 0 against.

#### **Public Hearing:**

4. Z21-12 Conduct a public hearing and consider an amendment to Ordinance 2002-05-16 Planned Development-Retail (PD-R) to certain uses in Area "C" Tract 2 of the PD. The property is addressed as 2715 West Belt Line Road and is located approximately 1,700 feet west of North Houston School Road and north of West Belt Line Road. The property is more particularly described as a tract of land situated in the George K. Sneed Survey Abstract No. 1278, City of Lancaster, Dallas County, Texas.

City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that this is a request to amend Ordinance 2002-05-16 Planned Development - Retail (PD-R) to allow financial services, restaurants, florists, barber or beauty shops, grocery stores, personal service, dry cleaning and laundry, electronics store, shopping center, and pharmacy uses in Area "C" Tract 2 of the PD. Currently, Area "C" of the PD does not allow retail uses. City Manager Mauldin-Jones read the permitted uses for Area "C" and Area "A". City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that pursuant to Section 14.1101 of the Lancaster Development Code (LDC), when reviewing a zoning change, there are five (5) considerations that must be made and read those five (5) considerations. Additionally, City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that on June 20, 2021, a notice for this public hearing appeared in the Focus Daily Newspaper. Staff also mailed notifications of this public hearing to property owners within 200 feet of the subject site and zoning signs were placed on the property and there were no letters in opposition or support for this zoning change request received.

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City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that at the July 6, 2021 meeting, the Planning and Zoning Commission recommended denial of this item and staff concurs with the Planning and Zoning Commission's recommendation.

Mayor Hairston opened the public hearing.

Ashfaq Ahmed, 8033 Preston Trace, Frisco, TX 75033, applicant and land owner shared his desire to bring business to the city.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Strain-Burk made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Gooden-Davis to close the public hearing. The vote was cast 7 for, 0 against.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Mejia made a motion, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Hill to deny item 4. The vote was cast 7 for, 0 against.

5. Z21-15 Conduct a public hearing and consider a Specific Use Permit (SUP) request for a gas station with eight (8) fuel dispensers; fast food restaurant, retail stores, and convenience store to be located within 150 feet of a residential district on a property located on the southwest corner of West Wintergreen Road and North Houston School Road. The property is more particularly described as a tract of land situated in the Marady Parks Survey, Abstract No. 1120, City of Lancaster, Dallas County, Texas.

City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that the property is located on the southwest corner of West Wintergreen Road and North Houston School Road and is 8.28 acres in size. The subject property is currently zoned Retail (R). The Future Land Use Plan of the Comprehensive Plan identifies this site as being suitable for regional commercial uses. This request is not consistent with the Future Land Use Plan of the 2016 Comprehensive Plan and that this is a request to consider a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a gas station with eight (8) fuel dispensers; a fast-food restaurant, retail stores, and a convenience store to be located within 150 feet of a residential district at the southwest corner of West Wintergreen Road and North Houston School Road. The Lancaster Development Code (LDC) Regulations states that a retail store with more than two (2) fuel dispensers requires a SUP in the Retail zoning district. Combination of a gas station, a fast-food restaurant, and a convenience store uses are not permitted within one hundred fifty feet (150') of a residential district. The previous applicant requested that item number Z20-01 be postponed to the March 3, 2020, Planning and Zoning Meeting, however, at the February 4, 2020, Planning and Zoning meeting, the City attorney recommended to the applicants that this case be postponed to the April 7, 2020, Planning and Zoning meeting in order to allow the applicant more time to address the outstanding issues. The applicant agreed for the case to be postponed to the April 7, 2020, Planning and Zoning regular meeting. On April 2, 2020, the applicant again requested for the item to be postponed to the next Planning and Zoning Commission meeting that would be held in person. At that time, the applicant sought an in-person meeting only and did not want to participate in virtual meetings. On April 7, 2020, Planning and Zoning meeting, staff recommended denial of the applicant's request to postpone the item to a future meeting and denial of the case and the Planning and Zoning Commission concurred with staff's recommendation.

City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that although the Z21-15 application has been initiated by a new representative, property ownership remains the same. In accordance with the Lancaster Development Code, Sec 14.204, Authority to Initiate a Request, "all...zoning and site plan requests...may be initiated by the owner of the affected property or his/or her authorized representative who files the required application". The initial request (Z20-01) was a request for a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a gas station with eight (8) fuel dispensers and a self-service carwash; an exception for four (4) semi-truck fueling canopies; a fast food restaurant and a convenience store. The current application (Z21-15) is a Specific Use Permit (SUP) for a gas station with eight (8) fuel dispensers, a fast-food restaurant, retail stores and

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a convenience store. On June 20, 2021, a notice for this public hearing appeared in the Focus Daily Newspaper. Staff also mailed notifications of this public hearing to property owners within 200 feet of the subject site and zoning signs were placed on the property. There were no letters in opposition or support for this zoning change request received. Based upon an analysis of the five (5) considerations that must be taken into consideration when reviewing a change in zoning application, staff recommends denial of the request for a gas station with eight (8) fuel dispensers, fast food restaurant, retail stores, and convenience store to be located within 150 feet of a residential district.

Mayor Hairston opened the public hearing.

Mr. Robert Nunez, 2929 Kings Road, Dallas, TX 75219 spoke as the representative of the client that is requesting the SUP. Mr. Nunez requested Council to table item for his client to make site plan changes to remove the combination of the restaurant, fuel station, and convenience store.

Councilmember Mejia asked staff if the presented site is the same that was proposed to Planning and Zoning. City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared the presented site plan is minus development of lot three (3). Councilmember Mejia wanted it noted that Council is not looking at the exact item that Planning and Zoning looked at.

Councilmember Wheaton shared that most residents she spoke with were interested in retail and restaurants and not the negative traffic a gas station would bring.

Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Jaglowski shared that the focus of negativity is on the eight (8) fueling stations that he viewed as the challenge.

City Attorney Ritter shared with Council the Motions available based on the item's timeline and applicant request to table.

Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem asked if two (2) fueling pumps are allowed without a SUP and Planning Director Vicki Coleman confirmed.

City Attorney Ritter repeated the two (2) separates issues presented in the item.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Strain-Burk made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mayor Pro-Tem Hill to close the public hearing. The vote was cast 7 for, 0 against.

**MOTION:** Councilmember Strain-Burk made a motion, seconded by Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Jaglowski to refer item 5 to Planning and Zoning. The vote was cast 7 for, 0 against.

### Action:

6. M21- 27 Discuss and consider an ordinance granting an exception to the City's Code of Ordinances Chapter 6, Fence Regulations, Sec 6.07.008 to allow the use of a black vinyl coated chain link fence on the property addressed as 2001 Danieldale Road and described as being 14.73 acres of land situated in the Nathan P. Pierce Survey, Abstract No. 1132, City of Lancaster, Dallas County, Texas.

City Manager Mauldin-Jones shared that this is a request for a seven (7) feet high black vinyl coated chain link fence at Park 20/35 Building 8, Lot 10 Block 1. Section 6.07.008 Fence Construction, Materials, and Setback of the fence ordinance states that (a) "All fences, unless prohibited elsewhere in this Article, shall be constructed or maintained with wood, brick, stone, concrete, vinyl, ornamental iron or other materials as approved by the City Manager or his/her designee. Fence posts shall be constructed or made of metal,

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brick, stone, concrete, fiberglass, or other material as approved by the City Manager or his/her designee. All fence posts must be placed at a depth of at least twenty-four (24) inches into the ground filled and anchored with concrete footers or encasement". The applicant contends that the black vinyl coated chain link fence will be used for security purposes on site. That the fencing will not be visible from rights-of-way as it will be screened with the existing landscape berm and living screen along Cedardale Road. The fencing is set back well into the site to provide security for the facility. The fence will have black slats within the fencing in specific areas to provide additional screening towards the residential area on Cedardale Road.

The proposed fence will be at a property that has an existing building with only one (1) side that faces a public street, Cedardale Road. The existing building on the property is centered and covers three-quarters (3/4) of the length of the site along Cedardale Road. Additionally, there are two masonry wing-walls that are attached to the west and east side of the building. The building and the two wing-walls facing Cedardale Road extend almost the entire length equal to the frontage leaving an eighth (1/8) of distance remaining on each side of the building for the fences to cover. As noted above, the fencing is set back well into the site to provide security for the facility with all employee and customer parking spaces along Cedardale Road outside the proposed fenced area. The fence will not be visible from Cedardale Road given the location and small space where the fence will be installed in addition to the grass berm and the living screen shown in the attached pictures. The fence will not substantially or permanently injure the appropriate use of the adjacent property and will not adversely affect the health, safety, or general welfare of the public. This exception will not be contrary to the public interest and will not authorize the operation of a use other than those uses specifically authorized for the district. Staff recommends approval of the exception subject to a requirement upon the property owner, and any successors-in-interest to both enhance and maintain the landscaping and the grass berm blocking the view of the fence from Cedardale Road all year round.

The property to be served by this line consists of 291.68 acres and is located at the southwest corner of Belt Line Road and Sunrise Road. The Public Works staff has verified that the location of the proposed public water and/or wastewater easement is acceptable. Having identified the location of these facilities, an easement must be granted by the property owner which must be considered and approved by City Council. Staff recommends approval of the resolution, as presented.

## **Agenda Caption:**

Consider a resolution accepting the Sunrise Road Phase II Feasibility Study's final report and recommending Alignment #2.

## **Background:**

The City of Lancaster, along with the Cities of Wilmer and Ferris, participated in a feasibility study coordinated by Dallas County to evaluate the realignment of Sunrise Road Phase II. On December 10, 2018, a Project Specific Agreement with Dallas County was authorized by City Council (at no cost to the City) in connection with a preliminary roadway alignment study to possibly widen Sunrise Road south of Beltline Road to the proposed Loop 9 highway.

The alignment study was finalized in February, 2021, as Dallas County now desires for the City to accept the recommended roadway alignment (Alignment #2) within the report. Alignment #2 was selected as it uses existing roadway for widening Sunrise Road and requires the least amount of rights-of-way needed. Dallas County will work to secure funding from different sources as there are currently no funds allotted for the engineering design and construction for Alignment #2.

Because, some of the proposed work may be done within the City of Lancaster, they cannot continue with securing the project funding until the City accepts the recommended roadway alignment since all three roadway alignments have different construction costs. In addition, similar city council approval is needed by the 2 other cities involved; Wilmer and Ferris.

### **Operational Considerations:**

Sunrise Road is currently a two-lane undivided rural roadway that serves as a north to south transportation route within an area of the City that supports industrial growth. The purpose of the feasibility study was to identify a preferred corridor and roadway configuration to accommodate north to south travel.

## **Legal Considerations:**

This resolution has been reviewed and approved as to form by the City Attorney.

#### **Public Information Considerations:**

This item is being considered at a Regular Meeting of the City Council noticed in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

## **Fiscal Impact:**

If engineering design and construction is funded, a new Project Specific Agreement will require city council approval.

## **Options/Alternatives:**

- 1. City Council may approve the resolution, as presented.
- 2. City Council may deny the resolution.

## **Recommendation:**

Staff recommends approving the resolution accepting the Sunrise Road Phase II Feasibility Study final report and approving Alignment #2.



## Sunrise Road Phase II Feasibility Report

## Introduction/Executive Summary

## **Project Background**

Sunrise Road is currently a two-lane roadway facility that serves as a north/south transportation route for southern Dallas County cities of Lancaster, Wilmer, and Hutchins. It is located in the heart of the International Inland Port of Dallas (IIPOD), a vital economic growth pole, in the southern sector of Dallas County.

### International Inland Port of Dallas

The Inland Port is 7,500 acres within five municipalities including portions of Dallas, Lancaster and Ferris, Wilmer, and Hutchins. It has no navigable water ways, but all roads do lead to watery ports at the end of the distribution line. Presently, the Inland Port of Dallas is a direct route to one of the ports in Houston Texas and ports in Long Beach and Los Angeles California. In Addition, the Plaquemine Port in the New Orleans area recently began working with the Inland Port of Dallas to provide better access to shipping lanes. This endeavor will involve utilizing the Panama Canal.

The port links large companies with distribution needs to the railroad, since the tracks run through the cities linked with the Inland Port. These include Union Pacific, Burlington Northern-Santa Fe and Kansas City Southern. Union Pacific has a terminal in the IIPOD area where containers arrive by rail and then further shipped by truck.

With the increasing growth and development in the IIPOD area, the City of Lancaster has an airport, which is at the tip of this area, that may experience more cargo and larger planes flying in and out as needed adding to the transportation capabilities in the area.

The entire area is accessible by three interstate highways: IH 35, IH 45, and IH 20 and houses area distribution centers such as FedEx, Amazon, Conn's, Home Depot, Loreal and others. The area will be accessible by the proposed Loop 9 from the south in the future. For this reason, Sunrise Road will be a vital northbound/southbound facility adding connectivity from Pleasant Run Road to Loop 9.

## **Lancaster Regional Airport**

Lancaster Regional Airport, formerly Lancaster Airport, is located two miles south of Lancaster in Dallas County and west of Sunrise Road. The airport covers approximately 548 acres and its single runway 13/31 is 6502 feet long and 100 feet wide.

## Future High-Speed Rail

The future Texas high-Speed rail will be the first truly high-speed rail project in Texas and the United States, connecting North Texas and Houston in less than 90 minutes. The segment of track traversing through the City of Lancaster will be located approximately a quarter mile west of the Lancaster Regional Airport.

## Sunrise Road

Existing Sunrise Road is a two-lane undivided rural facility with side ditches. It is a disjointed roadway between Pleasant Run Road and Van Road; lacking order of coherence when traveled. The section between Pleasant Run Road and Beltline Road (Phase I) was redesigned in Fiscal Year 2018 to become a four-lane undivided urban facility with an enclosed subsurface storm sewer system and periodic two-way left turn bays. This section is under construction and is scheduled to be complete in the first quarter of Fiscal Year 2021. The section between Beltline Road and Van Road which will extend to the proposed Loop 9 (Phase II) is the focus of this study.

## **Purpose**

A feasibility study is one planning tool that Federal, State and Local Governments use when a project is in the exceedingly early stages of development. It helps determine if the project should move on to more advanced phases of project development such as more in-depth environmental analysis, public involvement, schematic design, and right-of-way mapping.

The reason this type of study is done is to identify high-level or critical elements of engineering, impacts to stakeholders and the public and the economic feasibility of potential new roadways or improvements to existing roadways. Feasibility studies are not intended to result in detailed design, environmental analysis, or cost estimates.

The purpose of the Sunrise Road Feasibility Report is to identify a preferred corridor and roadway configuration to accommodate projected north/south travel demand and to provide a safe and accessible facility that supports that demand across the southern cities of Wilmer and Lancaster. The study analyzed potential roadway alternative alignments, including the existing

alignment and new alignments, for Sunrise Road from Beltline Road to the proposed Loop 9 facility that boarders the southern and northern city limits of Lancaster and Ferris, respectively. The study identifies three different alignments for the proposed facility and considers a No-Build (do nothing) scenario. The chosen alignment will possess a typical roadway structure of a four-lane divided urban facility with a 42' raised center median and an enclosed storm sewer system. The wide median will be used to accommodate a future third lane in each direction as well as left turn bays as traffic volumes dictate.

## Methodology/Method of Analysis

In our evaluation of potential alternatives and alignments, the Priority Group study team considered projected regional traffic, existing and planned developments, stakeholder input and the impact on the economy and environment.

As part of the Feasibility Study, Priority Group identified a list of key factors used to evaluate the potential alignments. These key factors included the following:

Engineering analysis
Traffic analysis
Right-of-way requirements
Existing and planned residential and commercial developments
Existing and planned utilities
Cost and economic impact, other planning efforts
Land use and parkland
Water resources and flood plains
Social and community impacts
Stakeholder Input
City Future Thoroughfare Plan
Lancaster Regional Airport
Future High-Speed Rail

Each alignment was evaluated based on these key factors and on how well it meets the purpose and intent of the report. In each scenario, the Sunrise Road Phase I alignment north of Beltline Road and the existing Ferris Road alignment are held.

### **Overview of Alternatives**

Following initial public outreach, stakeholder meetings and evaluation; Priority Group has identified three refined potential alternatives for improving northbound/southbound mobility on Sunrise Road through Dallas County. Each alternative has advantages and disadvantages (pros and cons) associated with the alignment scenario. The pros and cons are listed in the following matrix:

## Conclusion

In summary, Priority Group examined a "No-Build" scenario for the fast-growing Inland Port and found that the two-lane rural facility with open ditches would offer no benefits to development and provide limited safety for the increasing travel through the area. The disjointed configuration of the existing Sunrise Road would not facilitate the increased truck traffic; thus, impacting the movement of cargo and possibly slowing down economic growth in the area. For these reasons, we analyzed three alternatives with the proposed roadway typical section (Fourlane divided urban facility with a 42' raised center median) that will tie into Sunrise Road Phase I at Beltline Road. Shifting the Sunrise Road Phase II alignment to the east to tie in with Phase I construction will produce a more orderly and coherent facility. All alignments offer additional design options that depend on the topography and surrounding development and do not conflict with any routes from the Lancaster Regional Airport nor the future High-Speed Rail alignment. The estimated construction cost for the Phase II roadway construction, including right-of-way and utilities, ranges from \$20 to \$21 million. See Table 1 for project cost breakdown.

## Recommendation

After analyzing the three alternatives, all three alignments produce a traditional 90-degree intersection at Beltline Road, provide much needed compatibility for truck travel, provide an enhanced element of safety, and potentially promote economic growth. However, Priority Group recommends Alignment #2 based on its use of the existing Sunrise Road right-of-way south of Beltline which renders this scenario less intrusive with the need for right-of-way; thus, causing less impact to property owners.

### **Agenda Caption:**

Conduct a public hearing and consider a resolution approving an amendment to the Community Waste Disposal (CWD) agreement authorizing a three (3) percent increase in the existing solid waste and recycling service rates.

## **Background:**

On December 14, 2015, the City of Lancaster entered into a contract with Community Waste Disposal (CWD) to provide refuse, recyclable materials, bulk and brush collection services within the City.

On April 23, 2018, the City Council approved a three percent rate adjustment to all commercial customers, equivalent to a \$0.54 per month increase. This increase did not impact residential customers.

On September 9, 2019, the City Council approved a three percent rate adjustment to all commercial and residential customers, equivalent to a \$0.56 per month increase.

Pursuant to Section 14.02 of the agreement, CWD may petition the City for an increase or decrease in the rates no more than once per two years or every other year during the life of the contract, based on the annual Consumer Price Index (CPI) and fuel cost adjustment. A copy of CWD's written rate increase request and a copy of the contract provision for modification to rates are attached. The City received the attached letter dated September 7, 2019, on September 8, 2021.

### **Operational Considerations:**

Staff met with CWD to discuss ways to address customer service challenges. Both staff and CWD agreed to meet on a bi-monthly basis to evaluate recent and or ongoing challenges with the goal of improving services. CWD reported that they are continuing to closely monitor their operations in Lancaster and are enforcing their disciplinary policy in order to hold their employees accountable. Additionally, following the meeting, CWD made arrangements to ensure that moving forward all bulk collection routes are completed timely (Saturday of the bulk week). Staff has worked with CWD to implement a system of verification in order to remain proactive in addressing any mishaps. Staff has been working with CWD to ensure the company is more diligent with tagging and notifying property owners who are not in compliance. Additionally, CWD works closely with our Code Compliance Division on reporting properties not in compliance to ensure those property owners are properly notified of potential violations and to ensure staff is upholding the City Council Goal and Objective of implementing proactive code compliance in the community.

## **Legal Considerations:**

The City Attorney has reviewed and approved the resolution as to form.

### **Public Information Considerations:**

Pursuant to Section 14.02 of the agreement, "Contractor must receive approval from the City Council, after a public hearing, in order to increase the base rates."

This item is being considered at a regular meeting of the City Council noticed in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

### **Fiscal Impact:**

The contract allows CWD to request a rate increase for Residential and Commercial customers not to exceed 3%. If approved, the rate adjustment will not impact residential customers. Commercial hand collect customers will experience a 3% or \$0.94 per month increase. City staff will notify the 108 commercial hand collect customers via written communication following approval. The increase is not effective until January 1, 2022.

Upon approval of the agreement in 2015, the City maintained existing rates to residential customers which exceeded the new rate from CWD. Maintaining the rate allowed for funding of additional roadway maintenance and beautification projects. The increase will be absorbed and residential customers will not experience any change in rates.

The 3% rate increase will impact commercial customers with dumpsters billed directly by CWD. The fees will be reflected in the Master Fee Schedule.

#### **RESOLUTION NO.**

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, TEXAS, APPROVING A THREE (3) PERCENT INCREASE IN THE EXISTING SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING SERVICE RATES UNDER THE EXISTING SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL CONTRACT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF LANCASTER, TEXAS AND COMMUNITY WASTE DISPOSAL (CWD); AND PROVIDING THAT THE SAME SHALL BE IMPLEMENTED; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Lancaster, Texas is a Home Rule Municipality located in Dallas County, Texas; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to Section 363 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, the City of Lancaster, Texas is the exclusive provider of municipal solid waste within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City of Lancaster, Texas; and

**WHEREAS**, after sending out requests for proposals and receipt and consideration of the submitted proposals, the City Council passed Resolution 2015-12-101, awarding a contract to CWD to provide municipal solid waste collection within the corporate limits of the City of Lancaster, Texas and entering into a Solid Waste Collection and Disposal Contract (the "Agreement"); and

**WHEREAS,** Section 14.02 of the Agreement provides for the City to consider a base rate adjustment of no more than three (3) percent upon receipt of a written petition from CWD, and following a public hearing and consideration of the City Council of the City of Lancaster, Texas, does approve the requested rate increase for solid waste and recycling services for both commercial and residential accounts.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1.** The municipal solid waste contract by and between the City of Lancaster, Texas and CWD is hereby modified in accordance with Section 14.02 of the contract, and a rate increase of three (3) percent to the current solid waste and recycling service rates for residential and commercial service is hereby adopted; (all terms and obligations of the contract to remain unchanged and in effect).

**SECTION 2.** The City Manager is authorized to execute any needed documents to effectuate the rate increase after approval by the City Attorney.

**SECTION 3.** Any prior Resolution of the City Council in conflict with the provisions contained in this Resolution are hereby repealed and revoked.

**SECTION 4.** Should any part of this Resolution be held to be invalid for any reason, the remainder shall not be affected thereby, and such remaining portions are hereby declared to be severable.

**SECTION 5.** This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its passage, as the law and charter in such cases provide.

## **Agenda Caption:**

Discuss and consider the City's nomination for the fourth member of the Dallas Central Appraisal District (DCAD), Board of Directors.

## **Background:**

Property Tax Code, Section 6.03, requires that an election or appointment of members to the Board of Directors of an appraisal district be conducted in odd-numbered years. The term of office for elected or appointed members is two years, beginning in even-numbered years.

The Property Tax Code specifies the qualifications for membership to the Board of Directors in Section 6.03 of the Code. These qualifications are:

- 1. Must be a resident of the Dallas Central Appraisal District (DCAD) and must have resided in the district for at least two years immediately preceding the date the individual takes office.
- 2. May be an elected official of an agency represented by the DCAD.
- 3. Cannot be an employee of any agency represented by the DCAD.
- 4. Cannot be related within the second degree by consanguinity or affinity, as determined under Chapter 573, Government Code, to an individual who is engaged in the business of appraising property for compensation for use in proceedings under this title or of representing property owners for compensation in proceedings under this title in the appraisal district.
- 5. Cannot own property on which delinquent taxes have been owed to a taxing unit for more than 60 days after the date the individual knew or should have known of the delinquency unless:
  - A. The delinquent taxes and any penalties and interest are being paid under an installment payment agreement under Section 33.02; or
  - B. A suit to collect the delinquent taxes is deferred or abated under Section 33.06 or 33.065.
- 6. An individual is ineligible to serve on an appraisal district board of directors if the individual has engaged in the business of appraising property for compensation for use in proceedings under this title or of representing property owners for compensation in proceedings under this title in the appraisal district at any time during the preceding five years.

As a member city, the City Council may nominate an individual for consideration as outlined below:

- Nominate an individual via resolution and submit the resolution to the Chief Appraiser no later than October 15, 2021.
- The Chief Appraiser will prepare a resolution ballot and provide it to each City to review no later than October 30, 2021.
- Each City must submit their official resolution ballot no later than December 16, 2021.
- The results of the election will be affirmed on January 1, 2022.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Property Tax Code in 1979, the agencies of Greater Dallas County elected to amend the manner in which representatives were chosen.

Each of the incorporated cities and towns, except the City of Dallas, shall have the right to nominate by official resolution one (1) candidate as the fourth member to the Board. The said cities and towns shall, from among the nominations received, elect by a majority vote, with each city and town being entitled to one (1) vote, a member to the Board of Directors.

At the City Council Special Work Session held on Monday, September 27, 2021, The Honorable Mark D. Cook, Council Member for the City of Duncanville, and Pam Baugher were identified as individuals for consideration. Ms. Baugher notified staff that she wishes to respectfully decline the nomination for consideration to the DCAD Board of Directors.

The purpose of this item is for City Council to consider the nomination of Council Member Mark D. Cook.

Where work for which a permit is required is started or preceded prior to obtaining said permit, the fees above shall be doubled. Such fee if paid by check, money order, bank draft or other negotiable instrument, shall be made payable to the city treasurer. If paid by cash, such cash shall be remitted daily to the city treasurer, who shall deposit it to the credit of the general fund. Construction bond for work in a city right-of-way shall be \$10,000.00 bond amount; \$2,000.00 bond amount where work not to exceed \$2,000.00 in value for any one permit that may be acquired for that work within the right-of-way.

### Sec. 3.600 Backflow Prevention Assembly Testers Fees

An annual registration fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) shall be paid by each contractor or business for the first certified tester/employee prior to any work commencing with the city. - (b) The permit fee for itinerant vendors on private property is twenty dollars (\$20.00). The City will not require payment of this permit fee by locally-based charitable organizations or organizations engaged in activities such as bake sales or car washes. The permit is issued for a minimum of five (5) days, but not to exceed forty-five (45) days. Each eligible property may only allow use of the property for a temporary business for a maximum of forty-five (45) days per calendar year in accordance with Chapter 4, Article 4.100, Section 4.114.
- (c) <u>Replacement Permits</u>: Should a permittee lose the permit or otherwise need to obtain a replacement permit from the city, the cost of such replacement permit shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00). (Ordinance 2008-06-24; adopted June 23, 2008)

Beginning with the third food establishment inspection or any other food inspection outside of the two yearly inspections, a seventy-five dollar (\$75.00) fee will be assessed for each additional inspection.

## ARTICLE 6.000 ABATEMENT OF PROPERTY MAINTENANCE NUISANCE

The expenses incurred for abatement of the nuisance may be assessed against the real estate on which the work is done or improvements made. To obtain a lien against the property, the mayor, municipal health authority or code enforcement officer must file a statement of expenses with the county clerk of Dallas County, including the name of the property owner, if known, and the legal description of the property. The actual cost of abatement shall include an administrative fee of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00). In the event there are obstructions such as trees, shrubs, bushes, excavations, foundations, demolished structures or any similar obstructions, an additional charge shall be levied, assessed and collected against such premises. The lien obtained is security for the expenses and interest accrued thereon at the rate of ten percent (10%) annually on the total amount from the date of payment by the city. The lien is inferior only to tax liens and liens for street improvements. The city may bring a suit for foreclosure of the lien to recover the expenses and interest due. The state of expenses or certified copy of the statement is prima facie proof of the expenses incurred by the city in doing the work or making the improvements. This remedy is cumulative of the fine authorized for violation hereof by Section 1.109 of the code of ordinances. (Ordinance 13-00 adopted 4/24/00)

## ARTICLE 7.000 LIQUID WASTE TRANSPORT PERMIT

The city shall not issue a permit to an applicant until the appropriate fee is paid. Initially, a person shall pay a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first vehicle and fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each additional vehicle operated by the person. #### Sec. 3.200 When Fees Doubled

Where work for which a permit is required is started or preceded prior to obtaining said permit, the fees above shall be doubled. The payment of a double fee shall not relieve any persons from fully complying with the regulations prescribed in this article in the execution of the work or from any other penalties prescribed herein.

## Sec. 3.300 Second Inspections

Where work for which a permit is required and has been issued is inspected by the Inspection Department's Inspector and failed for noncompliance with city codes, and a second inspection is required, an additional fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) shall be charged for re-inspection and will increase by \$25.00 for each subsequent re-inspection.

#### Sec. 3.400 Public Schools Exempt From Fee Requirements

# **ARTICLE 4.000 BUSINESS RELATED FEES**

# Sec. 4.100 Peddlers, Solicitors and Itinerant Vendors

- (a) <u>Investigation Fee</u>: Each and every person seeking a permit under the provisions of the Lancaster Code of Ordinances, <u>Chapter 4</u>, <u>Article 4.100</u> "Peddlers, Solicitors and Itinerant Vendors" shall pay a fee of twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) per year for investigation of such application. Such fee shall be prorated, shall be paid in case at the time such application is made and shall not be returned to the applicant regardless of whether or not such permit is issued or denied. Persons representing firms or corporations shall be required to obtain separate permits, but shall pay only a single investigation fee. Persons involved in interstate commerce shall be exempt from payment of the investigation fee, but shall be required to obtain a permit and otherwise fully comply with all provisions of <u>Chapter 4</u>. Article 4.100.
- (b) The permit fee for itinerant vendors on private property is twenty dollars (\$20.00). The City will not require payment of this permit fee by locally-based charitable organizations or organizations engaged in activities such as bake sales or car washes. The permit is issued for a minimum of five (5) days, but not to exceed forty-five (45) days. Each eligible property may only allow use of the property for a temporary business for a maximum of forty-five (45) days per calendar year in accordance with Chapter 4, Article 4.100, Section 4.114.
- (c) <u>Replacement Permits:</u> Should a permittee lose the permit or otherwise need to obtain a replacement permit from the city, the cost of such replacement permit shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00). (Ordinance 2008-06-24; adopted June 23, 2008)

#### Sec. 4.200 Coin-Operated Machine Fees

(a) Every owner or operator who owns, controls, possesses, exhibits, displays or permits to be exhibited or displayed in this city any coin-operated machine shall pay and there is hereby levied on each coin-operated machine an annual occupation tax in the amount of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00). (Ordinance 2002-10-38 adopted 10/14/02)

The City of Lancaster shall issue a food service permit to the applicant if its inspection reveals that the proposed food service establishment complies with the requirements of Texas Health and Safety Code Chapters 437, Food and Drug Health Regulations, and 121, Local Regulation of Public Health. The permit shall be issued upon payment of a one hundred fifty dollar (\$150.00) annual inspection fee (includes two (2) inspections} set by the Dallas County Department of Health and Human Services plus an administrative fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00), which shall be due and payable on or before October I of each year. Such permit shall expire on September 30 of the succeeding year. Such permit shall be payable in full if the permit is issued at the beginning of the fiscal year or prorated as deemed appropriate by staff depending upon when it is issued within the year. All food service establishment permits shall expire on September 30 of each year and be issued upon inspection and payment of the required fee, to be effective on October 1. Beginning with the third food establishment inspection or any other food inspection outside of the two yearly inspections, a seventy-five dollar (\$75.00) fee will be assessed for each additional inspection.

### ARTICLE 6.000 ABATEMENT OF PROPERTY MAINTENANCE NUISANCE

The expenses incurred for abatement of the nuisance may be assessed against the real estate on which the work is done or improvements made. To obtain a lien against the property, the mayor, municipal health authority or code enforcement officer must file a statement of expenses with the county clerk of Dallas County, including the name of the property owner, if known, and the legal description of the property. The actual cost of abatement shall include an administrative fee of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00). In the event there are obstructions such as trees, shrubs, bushes, excavations, foundations, demolished structures or any similar obstructions, an additional charge shall be levied, assessed and collected against such premises. The lien obtained is security for the expenses and interest accrued thereon at the rate of ten percent (10%) annually on the total amount from the date of payment by the city. The lien is inferior only to tax liens and liens for street improvements. The city may bring a suit for foreclosure of the lien to recover the expenses and interest due. The state of expenses or certified copy of the statement is prima facie proof of the expenses incurred by the city in doing the work or making the improvements. This remedy is cumulative of the fine authorized for violation hereof by Section 1.109 of the code of ordinances. (Ordinance 13-00 adopted 4/24/00)

# ARTICLE 7.000 LIQUID WASTE TRANSPORT PERMIT

The city shall not issue a permit to an applicant until the appropriate fee is paid. Initially, a person shall pay a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first vehicle and fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each additional vehicle operated by the person. The permit is issued for a minimum of five (5) days, but not to exceed forty-five (45) days. Each eligible property may only allow use of the property for a temporary business for a maximum of forty-five (45) days per calendar year in accordance with Chapter 4, Article 4.100, Section 4.114.
- (c) <u>Replacement Permits</u>: Should a permittee lose the permit or otherwise need to obtain a replacement permit from the city, the cost of such replacement permit shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00). (Ordinance 2008-06-24; adopted June 23, 2008)

### ARTICLE 6.000 ABATEMENT OF PROPERTY MAINTENANCE NUISANCE

The expenses incurred for abatement of the nuisance may be assessed against the real estate on which the work is done or improvements made. To obtain a lien against the property, the mayor, municipal health authority or code enforcement officer must file a statement of expenses with the county clerk of Dallas County, including the name of the property owner, if known, and the legal description of the property. The actual cost of abatement shall include an administrative fee of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00). In the event there are obstructions such as trees, shrubs, bushes, excavations, foundations, demolished structures or any similar obstructions, an additional charge shall be levied, assessed and collected against such premises. The lien obtained is security for the expenses and interest accrued thereon at the rate of ten percent (10%) annually on the total amount from the date of payment by the city. The lien is inferior only to tax liens and liens for street improvements. The city may bring a suit for foreclosure of the lien to recover the expenses and interest due. The state of expenses or certified copy of the statement is prima facie proof of the expenses incurred by the city in doing the work or making the improvements. This remedy is cumulative of the fine authorized for violation hereof by Section 1.109 of the code of ordinances. (Ordinance 13-00 adopted 4/24/00)

### ARTICLE 7.000 LIQUID WASTE TRANSPORT PERMIT

The city shall not issue a permit to an applicant until the appropriate fee is paid. Initially, a person shall pay a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first vehicle and fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each additional vehicle operated by the person.
