Background:

As prescribed in the City Council Rules and Procedures as amended August 2022, Section D. Council agenda process Sub Section1.b, Councilmember Carol Strain-Burk requested an item on the agenda to discuss short-term rentals. During the Strategic Planning Session in June and July of 2017, City Council identified the goal to establish a program to address short-term rentals.

In November 2018 at a City Council Regular Meeting, Council considered an ordinance amending the Lancaster Code of Ordinances Article 6.12 Single-Family and Duplex Rental Property Regulations and various Subsections of Article 6.12 to establish Short-term Rentals (STRs) owner application and property registration regulations.

Ordinance No. 2018-11-45 defines Short-term rentals as "the rental of any dwelling unit, or a portion Thereof, for a period of less than thirty (30) days. The term does not include: (1) a bed and breakfast; or (2) a hotel, as those terms are defined in the Lancaster Development Code (LDC), as amended."

At the December 13, 2021, City Council Regular Meeting, City Council amended the Lancaster Code of Ordinances Article 6.12 related to residential inspections in order to provide increased code enforcement tools for problem properties that generate repeated complaints or citations.

Background:

On May 6, 2023, the City will conduct a municipal General Election to elect councilmembers for Districts 2, 4, and 6 for a three-year term.

Operational Considerations:

Dallas County Elections has the staff, equipment, and expertise to efficiently conduct elections. Participating with other municipalities and school districts helps defray the cost of the election and streamlines the voting process for residents.

Legal Considerations:

The election services agreement is attached. The City Attorney has reviewed and approved the resolution as to form.

Public Information Considerations:

This item is being considered at a Regular Meeting of the City Council noticed in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Fiscal Impact:

The City's final cost depends on how many entities contract with Dallas County for election services. Recent general municipal election costs are outlined below.

Estimated costs for the City's election are calculated by Dallas County Elections based on various factors including shared polling locations and total number of governing entities that participate in the election. If a run-off election is required, the City will incur additional costs.

RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LANCASTER, TEXAS, APPROVING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF A JOINT ELECTION CONTRACT AND ELECTION SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH DALLAS COUNTY ELECTIONS TO CONDUCT A MUNICIPAL GENERAL ELECTION FOR THE ELECTION OF ONE COUNCILMEMBER FOR DISTRICT 2, ONE COUNCILMEMBER FOR DISTRICT 4 AND ONE COUNCILMEMBER FOR DISTRICT 6 TO BE HELD ON SATURDAY, MAY 6, 2023; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE SAID CONTRACT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Lancaster will hold a municipal General Election for the election of a councilmember for Districts 2, 4, and 6 to be held on Saturday, May 6, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lancaster desires to participate with other municipalities and entities in Dallas County to help defray the costs of such elections and streamline the voting process for residents; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the City of Lancaster to secure election services from Dallas County Elections;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT REMEMBERED THAT on this the 27th day of February, 2023, at a duly convened meeting of the City Council of the City of Lancaster, Texas, a quorum being present, the Council issued the following order:

SECTION 1. That the Dallas County Joint Election Contract and Election Services Agreement attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit "1", having been reviewed by the City Council of the City of Lancaster, Texas, and found to be acceptable and in the best interest of the City and its citizens, be, and the same is hereby, in all things approved.

SECTION 2. That the City Manager is hereby authorized to execute the Joint Election Contract and Election Services Agreement with Dallas County Elections to conduct a general and special election.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall become effective immediately from and after its passage, as the law and charter in such cases provide.

FOR THE CONDUCT OF A JOINT AND SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD SATURDAY, MAY 6, 2023 TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE DALLAS COUNTY ELECTIONS DEPARTMENT

1) STATUTORY AUTHORITY FOR AND PARTIES TO THIS ELECTION SERVICES CONTRACT

- a) Michael Scarpello is the duly appointed County Elections Administrator ("Elections Administrator") of Dallas County, Texas ("County") and the Department Head of the Dallas County Elections Department ("DCED"). As such, Michael Scarpello is the County's Voter Registrar and the Election Officer of Dallas County, Texas and is authorized by Subchapter D of Chapter 31 of Title 3 and Chapter 271 of Title 16 of the Texas Election Code to enter into this Election Services Contract ("Election Services Contract" or "Contract") with the contracting authorities of the Participating Political Subdivisions listed in "Attachment F" of this Election Services Contract. DCED acts at the direction of the Elections Administrator. The County Elections Administrator, DCED, and the Participating Political Subdivisions together may be referred to collectively as "Parties" or individually as "Party."
- b) The contracting authorities of the Participating Political Subdivisions that are participating in this Election Services Contract are listed on the face page of this agreement and in "Attachment F" of this Election Services Contract and are hereby participating with each other in this Joint and Special Election to be held in Dallas County, Texas on Saturday, May 6th, 2023 under Chapter 271 of Title 16 of the Texas Election Code ("Joint Election"); and are hereby contracting with the Elections Administrator of Dallas County, Texas to perform the election services set forth in this Election Services Contract under Subchapter D of Chapter 31 of Title 3 of the Texas Election Code. The Participating Political Subdivisions acknowledge that they are participating in this Joint Election with each other to the extent that they have candidates and/or propositions on the ballot in this Joint Election. The terms and conditions of this Elections Services Contract also apply to any run-off election or re-count related to this Joint Election, unless otherwise agreed in writing.
- c) The Elections Administrator will coordinate, supervise, and handle all aspects of administering this Joint Election in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code and as outlined in this Election Services Contract. Each contracting authority of each Participating Political Subdivision will pay its share of the Election Costs to the Elections Administrator for the equipment, supplies, services, and administrative costs outlined in this Election Services Contract. The Elections Administrator will administer the election; however, each Participating Political Subdivision will be responsible for the duties directly administered by the Participating Political Subdivision. Pursuant to Texas Election Code §§ 31.093, and 31.098, the Elections Administrator may enter into a contract to furnish the election services requested within this Election Services Contract.
- d) If applicable and in the event a runoff election is necessary, the date of the runoff for this Joint election would be **Saturday**, **June 10**, **2023**. This Elections Services Contract

and its terms will be automatically extended to cover the Joint Runoff Election, unless a Participating Political Subdivision states in writing **on or before Friday, May 19, 2023** that it does not wish to participate in a Joint Runoff Election contemplated herein. DCED will provide each Participating Political Subdivision to which this Section 1(d) applies an estimated cost based on the formula in Section 10 (b), and such estimated costs will be paid in accordance with Section 10(e) ("Joint Runoff Fees").

- e) Joint Runoff Fees will be deposited into a special and separate Joint Runoff Election account. The Joint Runoff Fees must be deposited within seven (7) days after DCED provides uncertified results.
- In the event of a recount and upon a Participating Political Subdivision's written request, the DCED will provide assistance for a recount to the extent permitted and in accordance with Title 13 of the Texas Election Code ("Recount(s)"). The Participating Political Subdivisions requesting a Recount shall deposit with DCED the deposit received by the candidate requesting the Recount. DCED will bill each requesting Participating Political Subdivision for providing assistance for any Recounts, and such costs will be in accordance with the allowable costs under the Texas Election Code ("Recount Fees"). Recount Fees will be paid by the requesting Participating Political Subdivisions in accordance with Section 10 (e).
- 2) **ATTACHMENTS** The following attachments are hereby incorporated into this Election Services Contract as if set forth herein in their entirety. The Participating Political Subdivisions acknowledge that the following attachments are subject to reasonable changes by the Dallas County Elections Administrator before, during, and after Election Day and any runoff election(s), if any runoff election(s) are required by law to be held.
 - a) "Attachment A" is an itemized list of the estimated election expenses for this Joint Election and the amounts that each Participating Political Subdivision must deposit with the Dallas County Elections Department. It also includes the Deposit Detail for each entity. The Elections Administrator will amend "Attachment A" to reflect the changing estimates of election expenses that are caused by changing circumstances and by the withdrawal of Participating Political Subdivision(s), if any, from this Election Services Contract.
 - b) "Attachment B" is a list of the early voting polling places for this Joint Election. ("early voting vote center(s), or "early voting polling place(s)"
 - c) "Attachment C" is a list of the Election Day Countywide polling places ("vote center(s)") for this Joint Election.
 - d) "Attachment D" is a list of the people that the Dallas County Elections Administrator will appoint as deputy early voting clerks for this Joint Election.
 - e) "Attachment E" is a list of the presiding election judges and alternate election judges for Election Day for this Joint Election.

- f) "Attachment F" is a list of the Participating Political Subdivisions that will be holding elections in Dallas County election precincts and sub-precincts and the number of registered voters in each of those election precincts or sub-precincts. "Attachment F" will be amended if any of the Participating Political Subdivisions withdraw from this Election Services Contract. "Attachment F" will be amended to reflect the number of registered voters in each election precinct and sub-precinct as of the statutory deadline of April 6, 2023, for voters to submit applications to register to vote or changes of address in this Joint Election.
- g) "Attachment G" is a list of the Participating Political Subdivisions & Ballot Details
- h) "Attachment H" will contain, for each Participating Political Subdivision, the full name of the person serving as a point of contact, the physical address, the mailing address, a facsimile number, and an email address. "Attachment H" will be amended if any of the Participating Political Subdivisions withdraw from this Election Services Contract.
- i) Within five (5) business days after any of the foregoing attachments are amended by the Elections Administrator, the Elections Administrator will send each Participating Political Subdivision an amended version of the amended attachment by email to the email address provided by each Participating Political Subdivision in "Attachment H."

3) LEGAL DOCUMENTS

a) Each Participating Political Subdivision will prepare, adopt, and publish all legally required election orders, resolutions, notices, and other documents that are required by, or of, their governing bodies. Any orders, resolutions, notices, or other documents that are required to be posted to the County's website shall be provided by each Participating Political Subdivision to the Elections Administrator at least three (3) business days before the statutory deadline to post and such orders, resolutions, notices, or other documents shall be posted to the County's website as directed by the Participating Political Subdivisions. Any orders, resolutions, notices, or other documents that are required to be posted at an early voting or election day vote center shall be provided by each Participating Political Subdivision to the Elections Administrator at least seven (7) business days before the statutory deadline to post and such orders, resolutions, notices, or other documents will be provided to each election judge or clerk for posting. The County, the Elections Administrator, and DCED is not responsible for the proper posting or verification of posting of any required notice, order, resolution, or other documents at any early voting or election day vote center. The election judge, clerk, or their designee, at each early voting or election day vote center will be responsible for the posting of any such notice and verification of such posting to the Participating Political Subdivision. Such documents can be sent to the attention of: Michael Scarpello, Elections Administrator at 1520 Round Table Drive, Dallas, Texas 75247; or, emailed to DCECommunications@dallascounty.org, with a copy sent to Michael.Scarpello@dallascounty.org on all communications related to legal documents and questions regarding this election.

 Each Participating Political Subdivision is responsible for having its own election orders, resolutions, notices, or official ballot wording translated into the Spanish and Vietnamese languages.

4) **VOTING SYSTEMS**

- a) Each Participating Political Subdivision agrees that, during this Joint Election, voters will cast their ballots on the following voting systems, that are approved by the Texas Secretary of State in accordance with the Texas Election Code and the Texas Administrative Code: the ES&S ExpressVote Universal Voting System Ballot Marking Devices ("BMD(s)"), and the ES&S DS200 Digital Vote Center Scanner ("Tabulators"). Each of these systems are accessible to voters with physical disabilities. **On March 22, 2023 beginning at 10:00 A.M.**, until completed, at the County Elections Department at 1520 Round Table Drive, Dallas, Texas 75247, the Elections Administrator will test the BMDs and Tabulators used for counting ballots at the central counting station. At least 48 hours before the date and hour of each test, the Elections Administrator will publish a newspaper notice with the date, hour, and place of the testing.
- b) The Elections Administrator will provide Electronic Poll Books, BMDs, Tabulators, and any other necessary equipment for this Joint Election. For Early Voting and on Election Day, the Elections Administrator will allocate voting equipment to the vote centers in amounts reasonably sufficient for the anticipated turnout of voters.
- c) The itemized list of the estimated election expenses for this Joint Election are in "Attachment A," which includes, but may not be limited to the number of Electronic Poll Books, BMDs, Tabulators, and any other necessary equipment.

5) POLLING PLACES/VOTE CENTERS

- a) The Elections Administrator will select and arrange for the use of and payment for all of the early voting vote centers listed in "Attachment B" and the Election Day vote centers listed in "Attachment C". Early voting polling places and vote centers identified in Attachments "B" and "C" cannot be changed by a Participating Political Subdivision, but the Elections Administrator may consider changes requested by a Participating Political Subdivision. Any changes to vote centers are subject to the procedures outlined in Section 43.007 of the Texas Election Code. The Elections Administrator will finalize the vote centers as soon as possible before this Joint Election.
- b) Whenever possible, previously used vote centers that voters are accustomed to using will be used in this Joint Election; however, the Participating Political Subdivisions acknowledge that sometimes previously used vote centers are not available or appropriate for every election. Accessibility under the Americans with Disabilities Act is an important consideration for all vote centers in this Joint Election.
- c) In accordance with Section 43.007(o) of the Texas Election Code, the Elections Administrator will post a notice at each vote center of the four nearest vote centers by

driving distance. The Participating Political Subdivisions shall be responsible for any notices required under Section 43.062 of the Texas Election Code.

6) PRESIDING ELECTION JUDGES, ALTERNATE PRESIDING ELECTION JUDGES, ELECTION CLERKS, AND OTHER ELECTION DAY PERSONNEL

- a) In accordance with Sections 32.002 and 32.005 of the Texas Election Code, the Participating Political Subdivisions are responsible for the appointment of the presiding election judges and alternate election judges listed in "Attachment E" for each vote center listed in "Attachment C" subject to the eligibility requirement found in the Texas Election Code Subchapter C, Chapter 32 and Subchapter A, Chapter 83. The Parties acknowledge that approval of this Election Services Contract by the Participating Political Subdivisions shall constitute approval and appointment of the Judges and Alternate Judges listed in "Attachment E" by the Participating Political Subdivisions. The alternate presiding judge shall serve as presiding judge for an election if the regularly appointed presiding judge cannot serve. The Elections Administrator will be responsible for the administration of the election judges listed in "Attachment E".
- b) In accordance with Section 32.007 of the Texas Election Code, if a person appointed as a presiding election judge or alternate election judge becomes ineligible to serve as such in this Joint Election, and the presiding officer of the appointing authority is unavailable to appoint a replacement, then the Election Administrator will name a replacement presiding election judge or alternate election judge, amend "Attachment E" accordingly, and send each Participating Political Subdivision the amended "Attachment E" by email within five (5) business days after naming a replacement presiding judge or alternate presiding judge, and in any event no later than the time for closing the polls for the Joint Election..
- c) In accordance with Section 32.007 of the Texas Election Code If a person is unable or unwilling to serve as a presiding election judge or an alternate election judge, and the presiding officer of the appointing authority is unavailable to appoint a replacement, then the Elections Administrator will name a replacement presiding election judge or alternate presiding judge, and send each Participating Political Subdivision the amended "Attachment E" by email within five (5) business days after naming a replacement presiding judge or alternate presiding judge, and in any event no later than the time for closing the polls for the Joint Election.
- d) The Elections Administrator will provide county training programs and applicable notice of such training programs, in keeping with Section 32.114 of the Texas Election Code, for all of the presiding election judges, alternate election judges, and election clerks for this Joint Election. Pursuant to Section 32.114(b), the training programs will be open to the public free of charge.
- e) To serve in this Joint Election, each presiding election judge and alternate election judge must have attended either an online or in-person training class which includes information regarding recent law changes, court rulings, Voter ID laws, poll watcher rules,

- election equipment, election procedures, and COVID-19 safety procedures. New judges and election clerks must attend an in-person training class.
- f) The Elections Administrator will notify the Participating Political Subdivisions by email and post on the DCED's website the dates, times, and locations of training classes for both Early Voting and Election Day workers.
- g) To comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, vote centers are required to have interpreter assistance. If a presiding election judge of such a vote center is not bilingual and is unable to hire a bilingual election clerk, the Elections Administrator may recommend an individual to provide interpreter assistance. If the Elections Administrator is unable to recommend an individual to provide interpreter assistance for such a vote center, the Elections Administrator will notify the Participating Political Subdivision and request assistance in identifying an interpreter. In the event that a bilingual election clerk is hired by the Elections Administrator for a vote center required to have interpreter assistance, the bilingual clerk will be paid according to a rate set by the Elections Administrator. The Elections Administrator will charge that expense to the funds deposited with the Dallas County Elections Department for the conduct of the elections listed in this Election Services Contract. A Participating Political Subdivision may pay more money to a bilingual clerk than the rate set by the Elections Administrator, however that expense will be borne by that Participating Political Subdivision individually and that extra expense will not be charged to the funds deposited with the Dallas County Elections Department for the conduct of the elections listed in this Election Services Contract.
- h) The Elections Administrator will notify all presiding election judges and alternate election judges about the eligibility requirements of Subchapter C of Chapter 32 of Title 3 of the Texas Election Code and Section 271.005 of the Texas Election Code. The Elections Administrator will take the necessary steps to ensure that all of the presiding election judges, and alternate election judges appointed to serve during this Joint Election are eligible to serve and qualified to serve in this Joint Election. Under Section 32.031 of the Texas Election Code, the presiding election judge for each vote center shall appoint the election clerks to assist the presiding election judge in the conduct of the election at the vote center served by the presiding election judge on Election Day.
- i) The presiding election judges are responsible for picking up election supplies at the time and place determined by the Elections Administrator, which will be set forth in the letter to the presiding election judges requesting service for this election. Payments for the presiding election judge will be specified in "Attachment A."
- j) Any Participating Political Subdivision electing to pay their election workers for attending a training class must bear that expense separately from the funds deposited into this Joint Election account.
- k) The Elections Administrator will employ and or contract for other personnel necessary for the proper administration of the election, including such part-time help as is necessary to

prepare for the election, to ensure the timely delivery of services, supplies, assistance, and equipment, during the period of early voting and on Election Day, and for the efficient tabulation of ballots at the central counting station.

7) SUPPLIES AND PRINTING

- a) The Elections Administrator will obtain and distribute all of the election supplies and election printing necessary for this Joint Election, including, but not limited to, all forms, signs, and other materials used by the presiding election judges and clerks at the vote centers.
- b) The Elections Administrator will provide maps, if necessary, instructions, and other information that the presiding election judges need to conduct this Joint Election.
- c) Each Participating Political Subdivision must deliver a list to the Elections Administrator of candidates and propositions for their elections. The list must be in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese. The list must include the ballot positions for the candidates and the propositions. The list must include the correct spelling of each candidate's name and the precise wording of all the propositions. The Elections Administrator will email each Participating Political Subdivision a form for their use to create the required list. As soon as possible after each Participating Political Subdivision has determined its ballot positions for the candidates and propositions in its election, the Participating Political Subdivision must email the completed form to the Elections Administrator. The Elections Administrator will use the forms received from the Participating Political Subdivisions to create the ballot styles for this Joint Election. The Elections Administrator will deliver the proposed ballots to the Participating Political Subdivisions for approval. Each Participating Political Subdivision will be responsible for proofreading the proposed ballots and notifying the Elections Administrator of any corrections that are required for their particular ballots. The Elections Administrator is responsible for implementing the corrections made by the Participating Political Subdivisions to their ballots and then producing the ballots for this Joint Election.

8) OPTICAL SCAN CARD BALLOTS

- a) The Elections Administrator will supply a sufficient number of ballots to assure that there will be more than enough ballots for the expected turnout for the Joint Election. The ballots will be allocated based on an analysis of voter turnout for comparable elections at each vote center.
- Ballot usage shall be monitored by the Elections Administrator on an hourly and daily basis during early voting and on Election Day and additional ballots will be allocated if necessary.

9) RETURNS OF ELECTIONS

a) The Participating Political Subdivisions will establish a central counting station to receive and tabulate ballots cast in this Joint Election under Chapter 127 of Title 8 of the Texas Election Code. b) The Participating Political Subdivisions hereby, in accordance with Sections 127.002, and 127.003 of the Texas Election Code, appoint the following central counting station officials:

Administrator

Tabulation Supervisor: Danielle Grant, Central Count Station

Manager

Assistant Tabulation Supervisor: Angelica Munoz Central Count Station Lead

Clerk

The Participating Political Subdivisions hereby, in accordance with Sections 127.005 of the Texas Election Code, appoint the following central counting station officials:

Presiding Judge: Ruby Lee, Appointed by the Participating

Entities

Alternate Presiding Judge: Parris Long, Appointed by the Participating

Entities

The Participating Political Subdivisions acknowledge that approval of this Election Services Contract by the Participating Political Subdivisions shall constitute approval and appointment of the Presiding and Alternate Presiding Judge for the central counting station.

- c) The Central Count Station Manager or their representative will deliver timely, cumulative reports of the election results as vote centers are tabulated. The Central Count Station Manager will be responsible for releasing cumulative totals and vote center election returns from the election to the Participating Political Subdivisions, candidates, press, and the general public by the distribution of hard copies or electronic transmittals (where accessible). The Elections Administrator will operate an election result center to release election results in the Dallas County Elections Operations Facility, 1520 Round Table Dr., Dallas, Texas 75247.
- d) The Elections Administrator will link any Participating Political Subdivision's website to DCED's website. Participating Political Subdivisions that want such website linkage should deliver their website address to the Tabulation Supervisor at DCED.
- e) The Elections Administrator will prepare the unofficial canvass report after the results from all vote centers have been counted and will email a copy of the unofficial canvass to each Participating Political Subdivision as soon as possible after all returns, provisional ballots, and late overseas ballots have been tabulated, but no later than **May 16, 2023.**

- All Participating Political Subdivisions will be responsible for the official canvass of their respective elections.
- f) The Elections Administrator will be responsible for conducting the post-election manual recount, unless the Texas Secretary of State grants a waiver under Section 127.201 of the Texas Election Code. If no such waiver is given, the Elections Administrator will provide notice and copies of the recount to each Participating Political Subdivision and the Secretary of State's Office. Each Participating Political Subdivision must notify the Elections Administrator if such a waiver has been granted or denied as soon as possible, but no later than five (5) calendar days before Election Day.

10) ELECTION EXPENSES

- a) The Participating Political Subdivisions agree to share the costs of administering this Joint Election as specified in "Attachment A." The Election Administrator will charge a general supervisory fee not to exceed ten (10%) percent of the total cost of this Joint Election as authorized by Section 31.100 of the Texas Election Code. In no event will the ten (10%) percent general supervisory fee be refunded to any Participating Political Subdivision. If the ballot, candidates, or propositions supplied by the Participating Political Subdivision are changed after their initial programming and/or printing by the Elections Administrator due to a court order from a court of competent jurisdiction, the affected Participating Political Subdivision(s) agrees to pay all expenses associated with re-printing and re-programming the ballots pursuant to a court order including expenses for expedited services and "Attachment A" will be amended by the Election Administrator.
- b) Allocation of costs among the Participating Political Subdivisions will be according to a formula based on the total cost of the Joint Election multiplied by the Participating Political Subdivision's percentage of the total current, and active registered voters for the Joint Election ("Election Cost(s)"). Any special request(s) for additional vote center(s), early voting polling place(s), supplies, personnel, or equipment that exceeds the Election Costs will be billed separately as additional costs ("Special Request Fee(s)") Special Request Fees will be paid by the Participating Political Subdivision making the request. If the special request(s) is agreed to by all Participating Political Subdivisions and stated in this Election Services Contract, then the fees for the special request(s) will be allocated amongst all the Participating Political Subdivisions based on the formula for determining Election Costs. A Special Request Fee will not be assessed against a Participating Political Subdivision who requests an early voting polling place within their jurisdiction, and an early voting polling place is not already located in their jurisdiction ("Early Voting Request"). The costs for any Early Voting Request will be allocated amongst all the Participating Political Subdivisions based on the formula for determining Election Costs.
- c) The expenses for early voting by mail and personal appearance will be paid by each

- Participating Political Subdivision as set forth in "Attachment A."
- d) The Elections Administrator will determine the final election expenses to the extent practicable within one hundred and eighty (180) business days after the final canvass of this Joint Election or the Joint Runoff Election, if any. The Elections Administrator will provide each Participating Political Subdivision with a final, written accounting of all money that was deposited into, and payments that were made from, the Joint Election account(s) maintained by the Dallas County Elections Department for this Joint Election and the runoff election, if any.
- e) If the Elections Administrator requires additional funds to perform their obligations under this Election Services Contract that is more than the estimate listed in "Attachment A" or any estimate provided for Joint Runoff Fees, then the Elections Administrator will bill each Participating Political Subdivision using the same formula listed in Section 10(b) ("Joint Election Fees"). If the Elections Administrator requires additional funds to assist in any Recounts that is more than the estimate provided for Recount Fees, then the Elections Administrator will bill each Participating Political Subdivision that is participating in a Recount for such fees ("Final Recount Fees"). An invoice will be sent to each Participating Political Subdivision which will include the Joint Election Fees, Special Request Fees, and Final Recount Fees ("Final Bill"). The Participating Political Subdivision shall pay the Final Bill within thirty (30) days of receipt except for any amount the Participating Political Subdivision files a timely good faith dispute under Section 17 of this Election Services Contract. After all of the expenses of this Joint Election are paid and disputes, if any, resolved, any funds that remain in the account maintained by the Dallas County Elections Department for this Election Services Contract will be refunded to the Participating Political Subdivisions (the "Refund") as soon as practicable.

11) DEPOSIT OF FUNDS

- a) Attachment A: Cost Audit details the cost and expenses anticipated for this election; Participating Political Subdivisions will initially receive an estimate cost audit. The Final Bill will be distributed as soon as all cost and expenses for the election can be determined. Each Participating Political Subdivision hereby agrees to deposit with the Dallas County Elections Department one hundred (100%) percent of the full balance of money listed for their entity in "Attachment A: Deposit of Funds Detail" of this Election Services Contract by the due date of (on or before) March 3, 2023. The Dallas County Elections Department will place the money deposited by the Participating Political Subdivisions in a Joint Election account.
- b) The deposit of funds by each Participating Political Subdivision is an express condition precedent to the participation of each Participating Political Subdivision in this Election Services Contract. A Participating Political Subdivision may seek an extension from the Elections Administrator as to the due date for the deposit of funds. Such an extension must be sought in writing and prior to due date for such deposit by the Participating Political Subdivision. Any decision(s) made by the Elections Administrator will be

provided in writing to the Participating Political Subdivision. The Elections Administrator, however, shall not be required to grant an extension for the deposit of funds by a Participating Political Subdivision. For any Participating Political Subdivision that fails to deposit the total amounts specified in "Attachment A" by the dates specified in this Election Services Contract or any extension granted by the Elections Administrator, the Elections Administrator will be relieved from the responsibility to perform under this Election Services Contract for such Participating Political Subdivision.

- c) The Elections Administrator will only draw money from this Joint Election account to pay for election expenses that are included in "Attachment A" to this Election Services Contract and for other expenses that the Participating Political Subdivisions agree to in writing.
- d) If a Participating Political Subdivision withdraws completely from this Joint Election by March 3, 2023 or by March 13, 2023 for any special election, then the Elections Administrator will refund (as soon as practicable) that Participating Political Subdivision's deposit, less any funds already expended before the withdrawal and less the general supervisory fee authorized by Section 31.100 of the Texas Election Code. In the event of a partial withdrawal from this Joint Election, deposits will not be refunded to the Participating Political Subdivisions.
- e) The Elections Administrator will not make partial refunds to a Participating Political Subdivision if any candidate(s) or propositions do not appear on the ballot for that Participating Political Subdivision.

12) RECORDS OF THE ELECTION

- a) The Elections Administrator is hereby appointed the general custodian of the voted ballots and all election records of this Joint Election to the extent authorized by Sections 31.094, 31.095, 31.096, and 31.097 of the Texas Election Code.
- b) Access to the election records will be available to each Participating Political Subdivision as well as to the public in accordance with the Texas Public Information Act, Chapter 552, Government Code, at the Dallas County Elections Department, 1520 Round Table Drive, Dallas, Texas 75247 at any time during normal business hours. The Elections Administrator will ensure that the records are maintained in an orderly manner, so that records are clearly identifiable and retrievable per records storage container. However, access to election records that contain confidential information that must be redacted pursuant to federal or state law may be provided at the offices of the Civil Division of the

- Criminal District Attorney's Office of Dallas County, Texas at 500 Elm Street, Suite 6300, Dallas, Texas 75202.
- c) Pursuant to Section 66.058 of the Texas Election Code, the Elections Administrator will retain the precinct election records that are distributed to the Elections Administrator at the Elections Administrator's main offices and Elections Warehouse for sixty (60) days after the date of this Joint Election. Sixty (60) days after the date of this Joint Election, the Elections Administrator may arrange for transport of this precinct election records to the Dallas County Record Storage facility. If so, the precinct election records will then become the responsibility of Dallas County Record Storage for the remainder of the twenty-two (22) month preservation period. If the Elections Administrator does not transport the precinct election records to the Dallas County Records Storage facility, then the precinct election records will remain the responsibility of the Elections Administrator for the remainder of the twenty-two (22) month preservation period. Dallas County Record Storage will be responsible for the destruction of this Joint Election records after the preservation period. The Participating Political Subdivisions agree the Elections Administrator may destroy the records from this Joint Election after the twenty-two (22) month preservation period without further notice to the Participating Political Subdivisions, unless the events in Section 12 (d) occur.
- d) The Participating Political Subdivisions must notify the Elections Administrator in writing within three (3) business days after any official or employee of any Participating Political Subdivision becomes aware of any election contest in connection with this Joint Election. In accordance with Section 1.013 of the Texas Election Code, the election records must be preserved until any election contest is completed and a judgment, if any, becomes final. Also, the election records will be maintained by the Elections Administrator if there is an active criminal investigation, proceeding, or a pending request for public information, related to the election records until such investigation, proceeding, or request for public information is finally concluded.
- e) The Participating Political Subdivisions acknowledge and agree that the Elections Administrator reserves the right to intervene in any election contest or litigation in connection with this Joint Election in order to preserve any available remedies at law, and to preserve the Elections Administrator's obligations under this Contract and the Texas Election Code.
- f) If the Participating Political Subdivisions have changed their single member districts since their last election, the Subdivisions must submit new boundaries by **February 17, 2023**.
- g) The Elections Administrator will provide each Participating Political Subdivision records that indicate the jurisdictional boundaries of each Participating Political Subdivision by February 24, 2023. Each Participating Political Subdivision will have until March 3, 2023 to verify in writing that the jurisdictional boundaries provided by the Elections Administrator are correct.

13) EARLY VOTING

a) Under Sections 31.094 and 271.006 of the Texas Election Code, the Participating Political

- Subdivisions hereby appoint the Elections Administrator to be the early voting clerk for all of the political subdivisions participating in this Joint Election. The deputy early voting clerks that will be appointed by the Elections Administrator are listed in "Attachment D."
- b) Any qualified voter for this Joint Election may vote early by personal appearance at the main early voting polling place or at one of the early voting branch polling places listed in Attachment B. Early voting will be conducted as agreed by the Parties as follows:

Monday-Friday, April 24-28, 2023 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Saturday, April 29, 2023 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Sunday, April 30, 2023 from 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Monday-Tuesday, May 1-2, 2023 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

- c) All requests for early voting ballots by mail that are received by a Participating Political Subdivision must be transported by runner on the day of receipt to the Dallas County Elections Department, Elections Operations Facility at 1520 Round Table Drive, Dallas, Texas 75247 for processing. Persons voting by mail must send their voted ballots to the Dallas County Elections Department.
- d) All early voting ballots will be prepared for counting by an Early Voting Ballot Board appointed under Subchapter A of Chapter 87 of the Texas Election Code. The Participating Political Subdivisions agree to appoint **Chaka Terrell** as the Presiding Judge, **Patti Clapp** as the Alternate Presiding Judge, and at least one additional member of the Early Voting Ballot Board. In accordance with Section 87.002(c) of the Texas Election Code, the presiding judge will appoint at least one or more members to the Early Voting Ballot Board. The Parties may submit one individual for consideration by the presiding judge to be appointed as a member of the Early Voting Ballot Board and will notify DCED of the individual's name, telephone number, mailing address, and email address, if any, no later than **April 7, 2023**. A list of Early Voting Ballot Board members will be furnished to each Participating Political Subdivision by **April 14, 2023**.
- e) A signature verification committee will not be appointed and signature verification duties will be performed by the Early Voting Ballot Board in accordance with Chapter 87 of the Texas Election Code.
- f) The Presiding Judge of the Early Voting Ballot Board shall deliver notices of rejected ballots in compliance with Section 87.0431, Texas Election Code.

14) CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECKS

The Elections Administrator, their agent or assignee will conduct a criminal background check (in accordance with statutory requirements) of any person who is expected to or scheduled to serve or work in this Joint Election at either the Elections Department or an Early Voting location. Any person that does not satisfactorily pass the criminal background

check will be ineligible to serve or work in this Joint Election. Failure to obtain a criminal background check does not release the participating entity's obligation to pay for service rendered in good faith. Additionally, DCED will conduct a review of all poll workers against the Texas Public Sex Offender Registry and provide the results to the Parties.

15) ELECTION REPORTS

During the early voting period for this Joint Election, the Elections Administrator will deliver daily reports to each Participating Political Subdivision of the Early Voting Location Turnout Totals and Early Voting Roster. The day after the early voting period ends, the Elections Administrator will deliver to each Participating Political Subdivision, a Daily Early Voting Roster by vote center report that includes the entire Early Voting period. Pursuant to the Texas Election Code Section 87.121, the Elections Administrator will deliver these election reports by providing a link to a website posting.

16) WITHDRAWAL FROM CONTRACT

- a) No deposits will be refunded if a Participating Political Subdivision withdraws after the deadline to withdraw from this Election Services Contract has passed.
- b) In order to withdraw from this Election Services Contract, a Participating Political Subdivision must deliver to the Elections Administrator any certifications and declarations that are required under Subchapter C or Subchapter D of Chapter 2 of Title 1 of the Texas Election Code.
- c) The Elections Administrator will bill any Participating Political Subdivision that withdraws from this Election Services Contract for any expenses incurred prior to the Elections Administrator receiving copies of the certifications and declarations that are required under Subchapter C or Subchapter D of Chapter 2 of Title 1 of the Texas Election Code.
- d) Within ten (10) business days after receiving a withdrawal from the Joint Election in accordance with this Election Services Contract, the Elections Administrator will amend the attachments to this Election Services Contract as appropriate and provide updated copies of the amended attachments to all of the remaining Participating Political Subdivisions.
- e) The general supervisory fee authorized by Section 31.100 of the Texas Election Code will not be refunded.

17) AUDITING AND PROHIBITION ON WITHHOLDING OF DEPOSITS

- a) The Dallas County Auditor will conduct a review of the deposits and expenditures related to this Election Services Contract before the Final Bill or Refund is submitted to the Participating Political Subdivisions. Refunds will be submitted as soon as practicable.
- b) The Participating Political Subdivisions may request a financial audit of the Final Bill or Refund or dispute the Final Bill or Refund under this Section, if: 1) the Final Bill exceeds ten percent (10%) of the amount of the Participating Political Subdivision's initial deposit as required in "Attachment A" to this Election Services Contract; or 2) the accounting accompanying the Refund is ten percent (10%) less than the amount the Participating

- Political Subdivision determines, should be refunded, after its good faith review. The request for a financial audit or dispute must be done in accordance with Section 17 (d) below.
- c) Should the events in Section 17 (b) occur, in lieu of an audit or dispute, the Participating Political Subdivision may make a request that the Elections Administrator ask the Dallas County Auditor to review the cost allocation methodology for the Participating Political Subdivision's Final Bill or Refund ("Review Request"). Participating Political Subdivisions must submit a Review Request to the Elections Administrator within five (5) business days of receipt of the Final Bill or the Refund, whichever is later. The Review Request must set forth, in detail, the basis for any challenge to the Final Bill or Refund. Corrections to the Participating Political Subdivision's Final Bill or the Refund, based on a Review Request, will be determined at the sole discretion of the Elections Administrator. A Review Request does not extend the timeframe in Section 17(d).
- d) Should the circumstances giving rise to an audit or dispute in Section 17 (b) occur, the Participating Political Subdivision may send a formal written notice of dispute of the Final Bill or Refund ("Dispute Notice") to the Elections Administrator. This Dispute Notice must be received by the Elections Administrator no later than thirty (30) calendar days from the date the Participating Political Subdivision receives the Final Bill or Refund. This Dispute Notice must provide: 1) an itemization of the disputed charge(s) by the Participating Political Subdivision; 2) the basis for the dispute; 3) the methodology showing how the Participating Political Subdivision arrived at the amount disputed; and 4) documentation in support thereof. The Participating Political Subdivision will have no right to withhold any undisputed amounts set forth in this Election Services Contract or reflected in the Final Bill. Payment of undisputed amounts in the Final Bill must be made by the Participating Political Subdivision as set forth in Section 10 (e) of this Election Services Contract.
- e) Failure of the Participating Political Subdivision to submit a timely Dispute Notice, as set forth in Section 17(d), shall waive any and all disputes, claims, or challenges to the Final Bill or Refund by the Participating Political Subdivision. The entire amount of the Participating Political Subdivision's Final Bill shall be due immediately; or, any estimated refund amounts will become final.
- f) If the Participating Political Subdivision files a timely Dispute Notice in compliance with Section 17(d), the Participating Political Subdivision will have the right to conduct a good faith financial audit ("Financial Audit") for the deposits and expenditures related to this Elections Services Contract. In conducting the Financial Audit, the Participating Political Subdivision will have no greater right to demand access to or copies of the County's governmental or election records than those rights specified in the Texas Election Code and the Texas Public Information Act. The cost of any Financial Audit conducted by the Participating Political Subdivision shall be borne by the requesting Participating Political Subdivision and may not be paid for with funds deposited with the Dallas County Elections Department under this Election Services Contract. Further, the Participating Political Subdivision conducting the Financial Audit shall pay the Elections Administrator the

reasonable costs for time expended and copies provided in order to perform the Financial Audit. If the Financial Audit identifies overcharges by the Elections Administrator of more than ten percent (10%) of the initial deposit amount required by "Attachment A", the Elections Administrator will review and assess the findings of the Financial Audit and will negotiate, in good faith, to resolve any disputes for overcharges with the Participating Political Subdivision. The Elections Administrator shall not be bound by the findings or recommendations of the Participating Political Subdivision's Financial Audit. The financial records will be retained at the County Election Administrator's office until the conclusion of the Financial Audit and resolution of all outstanding audit disputes.

- g) In the event the representatives of the Participating Political Subdivision and the Elections Administrator cannot agree on the amount of the disputed Final Bill as set forth in this Section, then the Parties may agree to submit to non-binding mediation. If mediation is acceptable to both parties to resolve a dispute concerning the disputed Final Bill, the Parties will agree to use a mutually agreed-upon mediator. Unless the Parties come to a written agreement at mediation, the mediation will not constitute a final and binding resolution of the dispute.
- h) The Participating Political Subdivision acknowledges that the practical effect of the Participating Political Subdivision withholding undisputed funds that are required under this Election Services Contract would result in breach of this Elections Services Contract and the other Participating Political Subdivisions' taxpayers subsidizing the withholding Participating Political Subdivision's election expenses.

18) NOTICE

Any addendum to, change/modification of, clarification of, and/or withdrawal from this contract requires written notice to and written approval by Dallas County. Whenever this Election Services Contract requires any consent, approval, notice, request, or demand, it must be in writing to be effective and must be delivered to the party intended to receive it as shown below:

Any written notice required under this Contract shall be deemed to have been given when personally delivered, or if mailed, seventy-two (72) hours after deposit of the same in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, certified, or registered, return receipt

requested, properly addressed to the contact person shown at the respective addresses set forth above, or at such other addresses as shall be specified by written notice delivered in accordance this notice section.

19) LIABILITY FOR NEGLIGENCE

ALL PARTIES TO THIS ELECTION SERVICES CONTRACT AGREE TO BE RESPONSIBLE, IN ACCORDANCE WITH APPLICABLE STATE OR FEDERAL LAW, EACH FOR THEIR OWN NEGLIGENT ACTS OR OMISSIONS, OR OTHER TORTIOUS CONDUCT IN THE COURSE OF PERFORMANCE OF THIS ELECTION SERVICES CONTRACT WITHOUT WAIVING ANY SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY, GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY, STATUTORY IMMUNITY, OR OTHER DEFENSES AVAILABLE TO THE PARTIES UNDER FEDERAL OR STATE LAW. NOTHING IN THIS PARAGRAPH SHALL BE CONSTRUED TO CREATE OR GRANT ANY RIGHTS, CONTRACTUAL OR OTHERWISE, IN OR TO ANY THIRD PERSONS OR ENTITIES. ALL PARTIES AGREE THAT ANY SUCH LIABILITY OR DAMAGES OCCURRING DURING THE PERFORMANCE OF THIS ELECTION SERVICES CONTRACT CAUSED BY THE JOINT OR COMPARATIVE NEGLIGENCE OF THE PARTIES, OR THEIR EMPLOYEES, AGENTS OR OFFICERS WILL BE DETERMINED IN ACCORDANCE WITH COMPARATIVE RESPONSIBILITY LAWS OF TEXAS, BUT ONLY TO THE EXTENT SUCH LAWS ARE APPLICABLE TO THE PARTY.

TO THE EXTENT PERMITTED BY LAW, IF LEGAL ACTION IS FILED AGAINST A PARTY TO THIS ELECTION SERVICES CONTRACT, THAT PARTY SHALL BE SOLELY RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR OWN RESPECTIVE COSTS AND DEFENSE OF THAT SUIT.

20) CHOICE OF LAW

This Election Services Contract will be governed and interpreted by the laws of the State of Texas.

21) VENUE AND JURISDICTION

The courts of the State of Texas and the United States of America that are physically located in Dallas, Dallas County, Texas are the exclusive jurisdiction and venue for any lawsuit, cause of action, temporary restraining order, temporary injunction, injunction, petition for extraordinary relief, mandamus, or any other legal proceeding or claim arising out of the performance of this Election Services Contract.

22) SEVERABILITY

If any term of this Election Services Contract is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remainder of the terms of this Election Services Contract will remain in full force and effect and will in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated.

23) ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Election Services Contract, including any exhibits or attachments, contains the entire agreement between the Elections Administrator and the Participating Political Subdivisions concerning the duties required by this Election Services Contract. The

Elections Administrator of Dallas County, Texas and each Participating Political Subdivision hereby expressly warrant and represent that they are not relying on any promises or agreements that are not contained in this Election Services Contract concerning any of the terms in this Election Services Contract. Except otherwise specified in this Election Services Contract, no modification, amendment, novation, renewal, or other alteration of this Election Services Contract shall be effective unless mutually agreed upon in writing and executed by the Parties hereto.

24) PLURALITY, GENDER, AND HEADINGS

In this Election Services Contract, words in the singular number include the plural, and those in the plural include the singular. Words of any gender also refer to any other gender. Headings in this Election Services Contract are terms of inclusion, not exclusion.

25) RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES

The Participating Political Subdivisions, including their agents, or employees, are not an agent, servant, joint enterpriser, joint venturer, or employee of the County Elections Administrator, the County or DCED, and are responsible for their own acts, forbearance, negligence and deeds, and for those of their agents, or employees in conjunction with the performance of services covered under this Election Services Contract. The Participating Political Subdivisions represent that they have, or will secure at their own expense, all personnel and consultants required in performing the duties directly administered by the Participating Political Subdivision. Such personnel and consultants shall not be employees of or have any contractual relationship with the County, the County Elections Administrator, or DCED.

26) FORCE MAJEURE

No Party shall be in default or responsible for delays or failures in performance resulting from causes beyond its control. Such causes include but are not limited to acts of God, fire, storm, flood, earthquake, natural disaster, pandemic, epidemic, nuclear accident, strike, air traffic disruption, lockout, riot, freight embargo, public regulated utility, or governmental statutes, orders, or regulations superimposed after the fact. Any Party delayed by force majeure shall as soon as reasonably possible give the other Party written notice of the delay. The Party delayed shall use reasonable diligence to correct the cause of the delay, if correctable, and if the condition that caused the delay is corrected, the Party delayed shall immediately give the other Parties written notice thereof and shall resume performance under this Election Services Contract as soon as practicable. The date of delivery or of performance shall be extended for at least a minimum time period equal to the time lost by reason of the delay.

27) DEFAULT/CUMULATIVE RIGHTS/MITIGATION.

It is not a waiver of default if the non-defaulting Party fails to immediately declare a default or delays in taking any action. The rights and remedies provided by this Election Services Contract are cumulative, and no Party's use of any right or remedy will preclude or waive its right to any other remedy. These rights and remedies are in addition to any

other rights the Parties may have by law, statute, ordinance or otherwise. All Parties have a duty to mitigate damages.

28) CONTRA PROFERENTEM

The legal doctrine of contra proferentem will not apply to this Election Services Contract. Consequently, any ambiguity that may exist in this Election Services Contract will not be construed against the Party who drafted this Election Services Contract.

29) ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

Any inconsistencies in this Election Services Contract will be resolved by reviewing and considering this Election Services Contract and Attachments A through H to this Election Services Contract together in context with each other.

30) SIGNATORY WARRANTY

Dallas County and the Elections Administrator of Dallas County, Texas and all of the contracting authorities of all of the Participating Political Subdivisions listed in "Attachment F" of this Election Services Contract represent that each has the full right, power and authority to enter into and perform this Election Services Contract in accordance with all of its terms and conditions, and that the execution and delivery of this Election Services Contract has been made by authorized representatives of the Participating Political Subdivisions to validly and legally bind the Participating Political Subdivisions to all terms, performances, and provisions set forth in this Election Services Contract.

31) COUNTERPARTS.

This Election Services Contract may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same Contract. The Parties shall be entitled to sign and transmit an electronic signature of this Contract (whether by facsimile, PDF, or other email transmission), which signature shall be binding on the Party whose name is contained therein. A signed copy of this Contract transmitted by facsimile, email or other means of electronic transmission shall be deemed to have the same legal effect as delivery of an original executed copy of this Contract for all purposes.

Background:

Effective September 1, 2001, the Texas Legislature enacted the Texas Racial Profiling Law (S.B. No. 1074). The Texas Code of Criminal Procedure requires that law enforcement agencies collect information relating to traffic stops in which a citation is issued and arrests resulting from those traffic stops. The Texas Code of Criminal Procedure further requires that law enforcement agencies compile and analyze this information and submit a report containing the information compiled during the previous calendar year to the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency. City Council received a presentation at the February 20, 2023, Work Session .

Attached is the 2022 Lancaster Police Department Racial Profiling Analysis as prepared by representative experts from the University of North Texas. The Police Department had no sustained racial profiling complaints in 2022.

Beginning January 2011, the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education (TCOLE) posts a copy of each police department's racial profiling report on its website.

To further ensure transparency, the annual report will also be available on the city website.

Operational Considerations:

The Lancaster Police Department has adopted a detailed, written policy on racial profiling and currently collects the required information on racial profiling as required by State Law. The Lancaster Police Department contracted with the Justice Research Consultants, LLC.

Legal Considerations:

The Texas Code of Criminal Procedure requires that the Lancaster Police Department 2022 Racial Profiling Analysis Report be submitted to the City of Lancaster's governing body. The City Attorney has reviewed and approved the resolution, as to form.

Public Information Considerations:

Executive Summary

Article 2.132-2.134 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure (CCP) requires the annual reporting to the local governing body of data collected on motor vehicle stops in which a ticket, citation, or warning was issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, in addition to data collection and reporting requirements. Article 2.134 of the CCP directs that "a comparative analysis of the information compiled under 2.133" be conducted, with specific attention to the below areas:

- 1. evaluate and compare the number of motor vehicle stops, within the applicable jurisdiction, of persons who are recognized as racial or ethnic minorities and persons who are not recognized as racial or ethnic minorities;
- 2. examine the disposition of motor vehicle stops made by officers employed by the agency, categorized according to the race or ethnicity of affected persons, as appropriate, including any searches resulting from stops within the applicable jurisdiction;
- 3. evaluate and compare the number of searches resulting from motor vehicle stops within the applicable jurisdiction and whether contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of those searches; and
- 4. information relating to each complaint filed with the agency alleging that a peace officer employed by the agency has engaged in racial profiling.

The analysis of material and data from the Lancaster Police Department revealed the following:

- A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT'S BIASED BASED POLICING AND RACIAL PROFILING POLICY SHOWS THAT THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH ARTICLE 2.132 OF THE TEXAS CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.
- A REVIEW OF THE INFORMATION PRESENTED AND SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION REVEALS THAT THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH TEXAS LAW ON TRAINING AND EDUCATION REGARDING RACIAL PROFILING.
- A REVIEW OF THE DOCUMENTATION PRODUCED BY THE DEPARTMENT IN BOTH PRINT AND ELECTRONIC FORM REVEALS THAT THE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE TEXAS LAW ON THE RACIAL PROFILING COMPLAINT PROCESS AND PUBLIC EDUCATION ABOUT THE COMPLAINT PROCESS.
- ANALYSIS OF THE DATA REVEALS THAT THE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE TEXAS LAW ON THE COLLECTION OF RACIAL PROFILING DATA.
- THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE TEXAS LAW CONCERNING THE REPORTING OF INFORMATION TO TCOLE.
- THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE TEXAS LAW REGARDING CCP ARTICLES 2.132-2.134.

Introduction

This report details an analysis of the Lancaster Police Department's policies, training, and statistical information on racial profiling for the year 2022. This report has been prepared to specifically comply with Article 2.132, 2.133, and 2.134 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure (CCP) regarding the compilation and analysis of traffic stop data. Specifically, the analysis will address Articles 2.131 – 2.134 of the CCP and make a determination of the level of compliance with those articles by the Lancaster Police Department in 2022. The full copies of the applicable laws pertaining to this report are contained in Appendix A.

This report is divided into six sections: (1) Lancaster Police Department's policy on racial profiling; (2) Lancaster Police Department's training and education on racial profiling; (3) Lancaster Police Department's complaint process and public education on racial profiling; (4) analysis of Lancaster Police Department's traffic stop data; (5) additional traffic stop data to be reported to TCOLE; and (6) Lancaster Police Department's compliance with applicable laws on racial profiling.

For the purposes of this report and analysis, the following definition of racial profiling is used: racial profiling means a law enforcement-initiated action based on an individual's race, ethnicity, or national origin rather than on the individual's behavior or on information identifying the individual as having engaged in criminal activity (Texas CCP Article 3.05).

Lancaster Police Department Policy on Racial Profiling

A review of Lancaster Police Department's "Biased Based Policing and Racial Profiling" policy 2.01.1 revealed that the department has adopted policies in compliance with Article 2.132 of the Texas CCP (see Appendix B). There are seven specific requirements mandated by Article 2.132 that a law enforcement agency must address. All seven are clearly covered in Lancaster's racial profiling policy. Lancaster Police Department policies provide clear direction that any form of racial profiling is prohibited and that officers found engaging in inappropriate profiling may be disciplined up to and including termination. The policies also provide a very clear statement of the agency's philosophy regarding equal treatment of all persons regardless of race, ethnicity, or national origin. Appendix C lists the applicable statute and corresponding Lancaster Police Department regulation.

A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT'S BIASED BASED POLICING AND RACIAL PROFILING POLICY SHOWS THAT THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH ARTICLE 2.132 OF THE TEXAS CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.

Lancaster Police Department Training and Education on Racial Profiling

Texas Occupation Code § 1701.253 and § 1701.402 require that curriculum be established and training certificates issued on racial profiling for all Texas peace officers. Information provided by Lancaster Police Department reveals that racial profiling training and certification is current for all officers. Racial profiling training is specifically covered in Lancaster's Biased Based Profiling policy Section 4F.

A REVIEW OF THE INFORMATION PRESENTED AND SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION REVEALS THAT THE LANCASTER POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH TEXAS LAW ON TRAINING AND EDUCATION REGARDING RACIAL PROFILING.

Lancaster Police Department Complaint Process and Public Education on Racial Profiling

Article 2.132 §(b)3-4 of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure requires that law enforcement agencies implement a complaint process on racial profiling and that the agency provide public education on the complaint process. Lancaster Police Department's Biased Based Profiling policy Section 4D covers this requirement. Additionally, the Lancaster Police Department has a website for citizen complaints (http://lancaster-tx.com/813/Compliment-or-Complaint) which includes an email contact that goes directly to Internal Affairs. On the website are easily accessible links to a commendation and complaint form, including "A Citizens Guide to the Commendation and Complaint Process." Moreover, information on how to file a complaint is printed directly on each ticket.

A REVIEW OF THE DOCUMENTATION PRODUCED BY THE DEPARTMENT REVEALS THAT THE DEPARTMENT IS FULLY IN COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE TEXAS LAW ON THE RACIAL PROFILING COMPLAINT PROCESS AND PUBLIC EDUCATION ABOUT THE COMPLAINT PROCESS.

Lancaster Police Department Statistical Data on Racial Profiling

Article 2.132(b) 6 and Article 2.133 requires that law enforcement agencies collect statistical information on motor vehicle stops in which a ticket, citation, or warning was issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, in addition to other information noted previously. Lancaster Police Department submitted statistical information on all motor vehicle stops in 2022 and accompanying information on the race/ethnicity of the person stopped. Accompanying this data was the relevant information required to be collected and reported by law.

Analysis of the data reveals that the department is fully in compliance with applicable Texas law on the collection of racial profiling data.

Analysis of the Data

Comparative Analysis #1:

Evaluate and compare the number of motor vehicle stops, within the applicable jurisdiction, of persons who are recognized as racial or ethnic minorities and persons who are not recognized as racial or ethnic minorities. Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 2.134(c)(1)(A)

The first chart depicts the percentages of people stopped by race/ethnicity among the total 11,527 motor vehicle stops in which a ticket, citation, or warning was issued, including arrests made, in 2022.¹




Chart 1: Percentage of Motor Vehicle Stops in Comparison to Benchmarks

White drivers constituted 20.93 percent of all drivers stopped, whereas Whites constitute 7.62 percent of the city population, 27.74 percent of the county population, 43.43 percent of the region population, and 1.10 percent of the Lancaster Independent School District (LISD) population.²

Black drivers constituted 70.11 percent of all drivers stopped, whereas Blacks constitute 65.60 percent of the city population, 21.61 percent of the county population, 15.39 percent of the region population, and 75.90 percent of the LISD population.

Hispanic drivers constituted 8.61 percent of all drivers stopped, whereas Hispanics constitute 23.74 percent of the city population, 40.48 percent of the county population, 29.06 percent of the region population, and 20.20 percent of the LISD population.³

These motor vehicle stops were not charted due to the small number of stops relative to the population in Lancaster and relative to the total number of motor vehicle stops among all drivers (11,527).

The chart shows that White drivers are stopped at rates lower than the percentage of Whites found in the county and regional populations, but higher than the percentage of Whites in the city and LISD populations. Black drivers are stopped at rates higher than the percentage of Blacks found in the city, county, and regional populations, but lower than the percentage of Blacks in the LISD population. Hispanic drivers are stopped at rates lower than the percentage of Hispanics found in the city, county, regional, and LISD populations.

Methodological Issues

Upon examination of the data, it is important to note that differences in overall stop rates of a particular racial or ethnic group, compared to that racial or ethnic group's proportion of the population, cannot be used to make determinations that officers have or have not racially profiled any given individual motorist. Claims asserting racial profiling of an individual motorist from the aggregate data utilized in this report are erroneous.

For example, concluding that a particular driver of a specific race/ethnicity was racially profiled simply because members of that particular racial/ethnic group as a whole were stopped at a higher rate than their proportion of the population—are as erroneous as claims that a particular driver of a specific race/ethnicity could NOT have been racially profiled simply because the percentage of stops among members of a particular racial/ethnic group as a whole were stopped at a lower frequency than that group's proportion of the particular population base (e.g., city or county population). In short, aggregate data as required by law and presented in this report cannot be used to prove or disprove that a member of a particular racial/ethnic group was racially profiled. Next, we discuss the reasons why using aggregate data—as currently required by the state racial profiling law—are inappropriate to use in making claims that any individual motorist was racially profiled.

<u>Issue #1: Using Group-Level Data to Explain Individual Officer Decisions</u>

The law dictates that police agencies compile aggregate-level data regarding the *rates* at which agencies *collectively* stop motorists in terms of their race/ethnicity. These aggregated data are to be subsequently analyzed in order to determine whether or not *individual* officers are "racially profiling" motorists. This methodological error, commonly referred to as the "ecological fallacy," defines the dangers involved in making assertions about individual officer decisions based on the examination of aggregate stop data. **In short, one cannot** *prove* **that an** *individual* **officer has racially profiled any** *individual* **motorist based on the rate at which a department stops any given** *group* **of motorists. In sum, aggregate level data cannot be used to assess individual officer decisions, but the state racial profiling law requires this assessment.**

<u>Issue #2: Problems Associated with Population Base-Rates</u>

There has been considerable debate as to what the most appropriate population "base-rate" is in determining whether or not racial/ethnic disparities exist. The base-rate serves as the benchmark for comparison purposes. The outcome of analyses designed to determine whether or not disparities exist is dependent on which base-rate is used. While this report utilized the most recent 2020 Census as a population base-rate for the city, county, and region, this population measure can become quickly outdated, can be inaccurate, and may not keep pace with changes experienced in city and county and regional population measures. Utilizing a different base rate

can make differences regarding whether disproportionality exists or not. Even then, as noted above, disproportionality in the rate of stops among different racial/ethnic groups does not automatically equate to a finding of racial profiling.

In addition, the validity of the benchmark base-rate becomes even more problematic if analyses fail to distinguish between residents and non-residents who are stopped. This is because the existence of significant proportions of non-resident stops will lead to invalid conclusions if racial/ethnic comparisons are made exclusively to resident population figures. In sum, a valid measure of the driving population does not exist. As a proxy, census data is used which is problematic as an indicator of the driving population. In addition, stopped motorists who are not residents of the city, county, or region where the motor vehicle stop occurred are not included in the benchmark base-rate.

<u>Issue #3: Officers Do Not Know the Race/Ethnicity of the Motorist Prior to the Stop</u>

As illustrated in Table 3 near the end of this report, of the 11,527 motor vehicle stops in 2022, the officer knew the race/ethnicity of the motorist prior to the stop in 2.62% of the stops (302/11,527). This percentage is consistent across law enforcement agencies throughout Texas. An analysis of all annual racial profiling reports submitted to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, as required by the Texas racial profiling law, found that in 2.9% of the traffic stops in Texas, the officer knew the race/ethnicity of the motorist prior to the stop. The analysis included 1,186 Texas law enforcement agencies and more than 3.25 million traffic stops.

As noted, the legal definition of racial profiling in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 3.05 is "a law enforcement-initiated action based on an individual's race, ethnicity, or national origin rather than on the individual's behavior or on information identifying the individual as having engaged in criminal activity."

Almost always, Lancaster PD officers do not know the race/ethnicity of the motorist prior to the stop. This factor further invalidates any conclusions drawn from the stop data presented in Chart 1. If an officer does not know the race/ethnicity of the motorist prior to the stop, then the officer cannot, by legal definition, be racial profiling. Racial profiling is a law-enforcement action based on the race/ethnicity of an individual. If the officer does not know the person's race/ethnicity before the action (in this case, stopping a vehicle), then racial profiling cannot occur.

Based on this factor, post-stop outcomes are more relevant for a racial profiling assessment, as presented later in this report, in comparison to initial motor vehicle stop data disaggregated by race/ethnicity. Once the officer has contacted the motorist after the stop, the officer has identified the person's race/ethnicity and all subsequent actions are more relevant to a racial profiling assessment than the initial stop data.

In short, the methodological problems outlined above point to the limited utility of using aggregate level comparisons of the rates at which different racial/ethnic groups are stopped in order to determine whether or not racial profiling exists within a given jurisdiction.

Table 1 reports the summaries for the total number of motor vehicle stops in which a ticket, citation, or warning was issued, and to arrests made as a result of those stops, by the Lancaster Police Department in 2022. Table 1 and associated analyses are utilized to satisfy the comparative analyses as required by Texas law, and in specific, Article 2.134 of the CCP.

Comparative Analysis #2:

Examine the disposition of motor vehicle stops made by officers employed by the agency, categorized according to the race or ethnicity of affected persons, as appropriate, including any searches resulting from stops within the applicable jurisdiction. Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 2.134(c)(1)(B)

As shown in Table 1, there were a total of 11,527 motor vehicle stops in 2022 in which a ticket, citation, or warning was issued. The table also shows arrests made as a result of those stops. Roughly 69 percent of stops resulted in a verbal warning (7,935/11,527) and roughly 25 percent resulted in a citation (2,916/11,527). These two actions accounted for roughly 94 percent of all result of stops actions and will be discussed in more detail below.

Specific to **verbal warnings**, White motorists received a verbal warning in roughly 71 percent of stops involving White motorists (1,721/2,413), Black motorists received a verbal warning in roughly 70 percent of stops of Black motorists, and Hispanic motorists received a verbal warning in roughly 56 percent of stops of Hispanic motorists.

Specific to **citations**, White motorists received a citation in roughly 23 percent of stops involving White motorists (560/2,413), Black motorists received a citation in roughly 24 percent of stops of Black motorists, and Hispanic motorists received a citation in roughly 40 percent of stops of Hispanic motorists.

Finally, of the 11,527 total stops, 617 **arrests** were made [written warning and arrest (1), citation and arrest (132), and arrest only (484)], and this accounts for roughly 5 percent of all stops. White motorists were arrested in roughly 5 percent of stops involving White motorists (122/2,413), Black motorists were arrested in roughly 6 percent of stops involving Black motorists, and Hispanic motorists were arrested in roughly 4 percent of stops involving Hispanic motorists. As illustrated in Table 1, most arrests were based on an **outstanding warrant** (68.7%; 424/617) or a **violation of the penal code** (26.3%; 162/617).

Finally, as presented in Table 1, **physical force resulting in bodily injury** occurred in 6 of the 11,527 stops in 2022.

Comparative Analysis #3:

Evaluate and compare the number of searches resulting from motor vehicle stops within the applicable jurisdiction and whether contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of those searches. Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 2.134(c)(1)(C)

In 2022, a total of 973 **searches** of motorists were conducted, or roughly 8 percent of all stops resulted in a search (973/11,527). Among searches within each racial/ethnic group, White motorists were searched in roughly 8 percent of all stops of White motorists (195/2,413), Black motorists were searched in roughly 9 percent of all stops of Black motorists, and Hispanic motorists were searched in roughly 8 percent of all stops of Hispanic motorists.

As illustrated in Table 2, the most common reason for a search was probable cause (47.0%; 457/973). Among **probable cause searches** within each racial/ethnic group, White motorists were searched based on probable cause in roughly 35 percent of all searches of White motorists (68/195), Black motorists were searched based on probable cause in roughly 52 percent of all searches of Black motorists, and Hispanic motorists were searched based on probable cause in roughly 31 percent of all searches of Hispanic motorists.

Regarding searches, it should be further noted that only 116 out of 973 searches (see Table 2), or roughly 12 percent of all searches, were based on consent, which are regarded as discretionary as opposed to non-discretionary searches. Relative to the total number of stops (11,527), discretionary **consent searches** occurred in 1.01 percent of stops.

Among **consent searches** within each racial/ethnic group, White motorists were searched based on consent in roughly 27 percent of all searches of White motorists (52/195), Black motorists were searched based on consent in roughly 8 percent of all searches of Black motorists, and Hispanic motorists were searched based on consent in roughly 13 percent of all searches of Hispanic motorists (10 consent searches out of 78 total searches of Hispanic motorists).

Of the searches that occurred in 2022, and as shown in Table 2, **contraband** was discovered in 264 or roughly 27 percent of all searches (264/973 total searches). The majority of the time contraband was found during a search, it was drugs. Finally, as illustrated in Table 2, when contraband was discovered, motorists were arrested roughly 43% of the time (114/264).

Comparative Analysis #4:

Information relating to each complaint filed with the agency alleging that a peace officer employed by the agency has engaged in racial profiling. Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 2.134(c)(2)

In 2022, internal records indicate that the Lancaster Police Department received 4 complaints alleging that a peace officer employed by the agency engaged in racial profiling. Upon investigation, the complaints did not result in disciplinary action.

Additional Analysis:

Statistical analysis of motor vehicle stops relative to the gender population of the agency's reporting area. This analysis is presented in the report based on a December 2020 email sent from TCOLE to law enforcement executives in Texas.

In 2022, 11,527 motor vehicle stops were made by the Lancaster Police Department. Of these stops, 4,458 or roughly 39 percent were female drivers (4,458/11,527), and roughly 61 percent were male drivers (see Table 1).

According to 2019 American Community Survey (ACS) city and county population estimates of the U.S. Census Bureau, the City of Lancaster was composed of 53.7 percent females and 46.3 percent males. County population 2019 ACS estimates indicate that females accounted for 50.7 percent of the county population and males accounted for 49.3 percent of the county population.

Overall, in 2022, males were stopped at rates higher than their proportion of the city and county populations.

Additional Information Required to be Reported to TCOLE

Table 3 below provides additional information relative to motor vehicle stops in 2022 by the Lancaster Police Department. The data are required to be collected by the Lancaster Police Department under the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 2.133.

As previously noted, the Lancaster Police Department received 4 complaints alleging that a peace officer employed by the agency engaged in racial profiling. Upon investigation, the complaints did not result in disciplinary action. Furthermore, as previously discussed, of the 11,527 vehicle stops in 2022, the officer knew the race/ethnicity of the motorist prior to the stop in 2.62% of the stops (302/11,527).

Analysis of Racial Profiling Compliance by Lancaster Police Department

The foregoing analysis shows that the Lancaster Police Department is fully in compliance with all relevant Texas laws concerning racial profiling, including the existence of a formal policy prohibiting racial profiling by its officers, officer training and educational programs, a formalized complaint process, and the collection of data in compliance with the law.

In addition to providing summary reports and analysis of the data collected by the Lancaster Police Department in 2022, this report also included an extensive presentation of some of the limitations involved in the level of data collection currently required by law and the methodological problems associated with analyzing such data for the Lancaster Police Department as well as police agencies across Texas.

Appendix A Racial Profiling Statutes and Laws

Texas Racial Profling Statutes

Art. 3.05. RACIAL PROFILING.

In this code, "racial profiling" means a law enforcement-initiated action based on an individual's race, ethnicity, or national origin rather than on the individual's behavior or on information identifying the individual as having engaged in criminal activity.

Added by Acts 2001, 77th Leg., ch. 947, Sec. 2, eff. Sept. 1, 2001.

Art. 2.131. RACIAL PROFILING PROHIBITED.

A peace officer may not engage in racial profiling.

Added by Acts 2001, 77th Leg., ch. 947, Sec. 1, eff. Sept. 1, 2001.

Art. 2.132. LAW ENFORCEMENT POLICY ON RACIAL PROFILING.

- (a) In this article:
 - (1) "Law enforcement agency" means an agency of the state, or of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state, that employs peace officers who make motor vehicle stops in the routine performance of the officers' official duties.
 - (2) "Motor vehicle stop" means an occasion in which a peace officer stops a motor vehicle for an alleged violation of a law or ordinance.
 - (3) "Race or ethnicity" means the following categories:
 - (A) Alaska native or American Indian;
 - (B) Asian or Pacific Islander:
 - (C) black;
 - (D) white; and
 - (E) Hispanic or Latino.
- (b) Each law enforcement agency in this state shall adopt a detailed written policy on racial profiling. The policy must:
 - (1) clearly define acts constituting racial profiling;
 - (2) strictly prohibit peace officers employed by the agency from engaging in racial profiling;

- (3) implement a process by which an individual may file a complaint with the agency if the individual believes that a peace officer employed by the agency has engaged in racial profiling with respect to the individual;
- (4) provide public education relating to the agency's compliment and complaint process, including providing the telephone number, mailing address, and e-mail address to make a compliment or complaint with respect to each ticket, citation, or warning issued by a peace officer;
- (5) require appropriate corrective action to be taken against a peace officer employed by the agency who, after an investigation, is shown to have engaged in racial profiling in violation of the agency's policy adopted under this article;
- (6) require collection of information relating to motor vehicle stops in which a ticket, citation, or warning is issued and to arrests made as a result of those stops, including information relating to:
 - (A) the race or ethnicity of the individual detained;
 - (B) whether a search was conducted and, if so, whether the individual detained consented to the search;
 - (C) whether the peace officer knew the race or ethnicity of the individual detained before detaining that individual;
 - (D) whether the peace officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury, as that term is defined by Section 1.07, Penal Code, during the stop;
 - (E) the location of the stop; and
 - (F) the reason for the stop; and
- (7) require the chief administrator of the agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, to submit an annual report of the information collected under Subdivision (6) to:
 - (A) the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement; and
 - (B) the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency, if the agency is an agency of a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state.
- (c) The data collected as a result of the reporting requirements of this article shall not constitute prima facie evidence of racial profiling.

- (d) On adoption of a policy under Subsection (b), a law enforcement agency shall examine the feasibility of installing video camera and transmitter-activated equipment in each agency law enforcement motor vehicle regularly used to make motor vehicle stops and transmitter-activated equipment in each agency law enforcement motorcycle regularly used to make motor vehicle stops. The agency also shall examine the feasibility of equipping each peace officer who regularly detains or stops motor vehicles with a body worn camera, as that term is defined by Section 1701.651, Occupations Code. If a law enforcement agency installs video or audio equipment or equips peace officers with body worn cameras as provided by this subsection, the policy adopted by the agency under Subsection (b) must include standards for reviewing video and audio documentation.
- (e) A report required under Subsection (b)(7) may not include identifying information about a peace officer who makes a motor vehicle stop or about an individual who is stopped or arrested by a peace officer. This subsection does not affect the collection of information as required by a policy under Subsection (b)(6).
- (f) On the commencement of an investigation by a law enforcement agency of a complaint described by Subsection (b)(3) in which a video or audio recording of the occurrence on which the complaint is based was made, the agency shall promptly provide a copy of the recording to the peace officer who is the subject of the complaint on written request by the officer.
- (g) On a finding by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement that the chief administrator of a law enforcement agency intentionally failed to submit a report required under Subsection (b)(7), the commission shall begin disciplinary procedures against the chief administrator.
- (h) A law enforcement agency shall review the data collected under Subsection (b)(6) to identify any improvements the agency could make in its practices and policies regarding motor vehicle stops.

Art. 2.133. REPORTS REQUIRED FOR MOTOR VEHICLE STOPS.

- (a) In this article, "race or ethnicity" has the meaning assigned by Article 2.132(a).
- (b) A peace officer who stops a motor vehicle for an alleged violation of a law or ordinance shall report to the law enforcement agency that employs the officer information relating to the stop, including:
 - (1) a physical description of any person operating the motor vehicle who is detained as a result of the stop, including:
 - (A) the person's gender; and
 - (B) the person's race or ethnicity, as stated by the person or, if the person does not state the person's race or ethnicity, as determined by the officer to the best of the officer's ability;
 - (2) the initial reason for the stop;
 - (3) whether the officer conducted a search as a result of the stop and, if so, whether the person detained consented to the search;
 - (4) whether any contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of the search and a description of the contraband or evidence;
 - (5) the reason for the search, including whether:
 - (A) any contraband or other evidence was in plain view;
 - (B) any probable cause or reasonable suspicion existed to perform the search; or
 - (C) the search was performed as a result of the towing of the motor vehicle or the arrest of any person in the motor vehicle;
 - (6) whether the officer made an arrest as a result of the stop or the search, including a statement of whether the arrest was based on a violation of the Penal Code, a violation of a traffic law or ordinance, or an outstanding warrant and a statement of the offense charged;
 - (7) the street address or approximate location of the stop;
 - (8) whether the officer issued a verbal or written warning or a ticket or citation as a result of the stop; and

- (9) whether the officer used physical force that resulted in bodily injury, as that term is defined by Section 1.07, Penal Code, during the stop.
- (c) The chief administrator of a law enforcement agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, is responsible for auditing reports under Subsection (b) to ensure that the race or ethnicity of the person operating the motor vehicle is being reported.

Art. 2.134. COMPILATION AND ANALYSIS OF INFORMATION COLLECTED.

- (a) In this article:
 - (1) "Motor vehicle stop" has the meaning assigned by Article 2.132(a).
 - (2) "Race or ethnicity" has the meaning assigned by Article 2.132(a).
- (b) A law enforcement agency shall compile and analyze the information contained in each report received by the agency under Article 2.133. Not later than March 1 of each year, each law enforcement agency shall submit a report containing the incident-based data compiled during the previous calendar year to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement and, if the law enforcement agency is a local law enforcement agency, to the governing body of each county or municipality served by the agency.
- (c) A report required under Subsection (b) must be submitted by the chief administrator of the law enforcement agency, regardless of whether the administrator is elected, employed, or appointed, and must include:
 - (1) a comparative analysis of the information compiled under Article 2.133 to:
 - (A) evaluate and compare the number of motor vehicle stops, within the applicable jurisdiction, of persons who are recognized as racial or ethnic minorities and persons who are not recognized as racial or ethnic minorities; (B) examine the disposition of motor vehicle stops made by officers employed by the agency,

- categorized according to the race or ethnicity of the affected persons, as appropriate, including any searches resulting from stops within the applicable jurisdiction; and
- (C) evaluate and compare the number of searches resulting from motor vehicle stops within the applicable jurisdiction and whether contraband or other evidence was discovered in the course of those searches; and
- (2) information relating to each complaint filed with the agency alleging that a peace officer employed by the agency has engaged in racial profiling.
- (d) A report required under Subsection (b) may not include identifying information about a peace officer who makes a motor vehicle stop or about an individual who is stopped or arrested by a peace officer. This subsection does not affect the reporting of information required under Article 2.133 (b) (1).
- (e) The Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, in accordance with Section $\underline{1701.162}$, Occupations Code, shall develop guidelines for compiling and reporting information as required by this article.
- (f) The data collected as a result of the reporting requirements of this article shall not constitute prima facie evidence of racial profiling.
- (g) On a finding by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement that the chief administrator of a law enforcement agency intentionally failed to submit a report required under Subsection (b), the commission shall begin disciplinary procedures against the chief administrator.

Art. 2.136. LIABILITY.

A peace officer is not liable for damages arising from an act relating to the collection or reporting of information as required by Article 2.133 or under a policy adopted under Article 2.132.

Art. 2.137. PROVISION OF FUNDING OR EQUIPMENT.

- (a) The Department of Public Safety shall adopt rules for providing funds or video and audio equipment to law enforcement agencies for the purpose of installing video and audio equipment in law enforcement motor vehicles and motorcycles or equipping peace officers with body worn cameras, including specifying criteria to prioritize funding or equipment provided to law enforcement agencies. The criteria may include consideration of tax effort, financial hardship, available revenue, and budget surpluses. The criteria must give priority to:
 - (1) law enforcement agencies that employ peace officers whose primary duty is traffic enforcement;
 - (2) smaller jurisdictions; and
 - (3) municipal and county law enforcement agencies.
- (b) The Department of Public Safety shall collaborate with an institution of higher education to identify law enforcement agencies that need funds or video and audio equipment for the purpose of installing video and audio equipment in law enforcement motor vehicles and motorcycles or equipping peace officers with body worn cameras. The collaboration may include the use of a survey to assist in developing criteria to prioritize funding or equipment provided to law enforcement agencies.
- (c) To receive funds or video and audio equipment from the state for the purpose of installing video and audio equipment in law enforcement motor vehicles and motorcycles or equipping peace officers with body worn cameras, the governing body of a county or municipality, in conjunction with the law enforcement agency serving the county or municipality, shall certify to the Department of Public Safety that the law enforcement agency needs funds or video and audio equipment for that purpose.
- (d) On receipt of funds or video and audio equipment from the state for the purpose of installing video and audio equipment in law enforcement motor vehicles and motorcycles or equipping peace officers with body worn cameras, the governing body of a county or municipality, in conjunction with the law enforcement agency serving the county or municipality, shall certify to the Department of Public Safety that the law enforcement agency has taken the necessary actions to use and is using video and audio equipment and body worn cameras for those purposes.

Art. 2.1385. CIVIL PENALTY.

- (a) If the chief administrator of a local law enforcement agency intentionally fails to submit the incident-based data as required by Article 2.134, the agency is liable to the state for a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed \$5,000 for each violation. The attorney general may sue to collect a civil penalty under this subsection.
- (b) From money appropriated to the agency for the administration of the agency, the executive director of a state law enforcement agency that intentionally fails to submit the incident-based data as required by Article $\underline{2.134}$ shall remit to the comptroller the amount of \$1,000 for each violation.
- (c) Money collected under this article shall be deposited in the state treasury to the credit of the general revenue fund.

This Operations Directive is for internal use only and does not enhance an officer's civil or criminal liability in any way. It should not be construed as a creation of a higher standard of safety or care in an evidentiary sense, with respect to third party claims. Violations of this Operations Directive, if proven, may only form the basis for a complaint by this Department, and only in a non-judicial administrative setting.

SECTION 1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to reaffirm the Lancaster Police Department's commitment to unbiased policing in all of its encounters between officers and any person; to reinforce procedurally just ways that serve to ensure public confidence and mutual trust through the provision of services in a fair and equitable fashion; and to protect our officers from unwarranted accusations of misconduct when they act within the dictate of departmental policy and the law.

SECTION 2 POLICY

- A. It is the policy of the department to protect the constitutional rights of all persons. Allegations of racial profiling or discriminatory practices, real or perceived, are detrimental to the relationship between police and the communities they protect and serve because they strike at the basic foundation of public trust. This trust is essential to effective community-based policing. Racial profiling is considered misuse of valuable police resources; such improper methods violate the civil rights of members of the public and may lead to increased exposure to liability for the officer and the department. The department does not endorse, train, teach, support, or condone any type of bias, stereotyping, or racial profiling by its officers. While recognizing that most officers perform their duties in a professional, ethical, and impartial manner, the department is committed to identifying and eliminating any instances of racial profiling.
- B. It is the policy of the department to:
 - 1. provide all people within the community fair and impartial police services consistent with procedural justice, constitutional and statutory mandates;
 - 2. assure the highest standard of integrity and ethics among all our members;
 - 3. respect the diversity and the lawful cultural practices of all people;
 - take positive steps to identify, prevent, and eliminate any instances of racial profiling by our members; and

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- continue our commitment to community based policing and problem solving, including vigorous, lawful and nondiscriminatory traffic enforcement that promotes public safety and strengthens public trust, confidence, and awareness
- C. It is the policy of the department to police in a proactive manner and to aggressively investigate suspected violations of law. Officers shall actively enforce local, state and federal laws in a responsible and professional manner without regard to race, gender, ethnicity, or national origin. Officers are strictly prohibited from engaging in racial profiling as defined in this policy. This policy shall be applicable to all persons, whether drivers, passengers, or pedestrians.
- D. Officers, when dealing with the community shall conduct themselves in procedurally just ways, procedurally just behavior is based on four central principles: (1) treating people with dignity and respect, (2) giving individuals "voices" during encounters, (3) being neutral and transparent in decision making and (4) conveying trustworthy motives. These principles lead to relationships in which the community trusts that officers are honest, unbiased, benevolent, and lawful. The community therefore feels obligated to follow the law and the dictates of legal authorities and is more willing to cooperate with and engage those authorities because it believes that it shares a common set of interest and values with the community.

SECTION 3 DEFINITIONS

- A. <u>Bias:</u> prejudice or partiality based on preconceived ideas, a person's upbringing, culture, experience, or education.
- B. <u>Biased Policing:</u> stopping, detaining, searching, or attempting to search, or using force against a person based upon his or her race, ethnic background, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, cultural group, or any other identifiable group.
- C. <u>Ethnicity:</u> a cluster of characteristics that may include race but also cultural characteristics or traits that are shared by a group with a common experience or history.
- D. <u>Frisk:</u> a limited search or patting down of a suspect's outer clothing for the purpose of officer safety. A frisk must be based on reasonable suspicion that the suspect is armed with a deadly weapon, and that if he is not searched and disarmed, harm will come to the officer or another person. A limited search or frisk of an automobile after a valid stop is permissible if the officer has reasonable suspicion the suspect is dangerous and might gain immediate control of a weapon. The search is limited to the areas in which a weapon may be placed or hidden.
- E. Gender: unlike sex, a psychological classification based on cultural characteristics or traits.
- F. Gender Profiling: is defined as a law enforcement-initiated action based on an individual's gender rather than on the individual's behavior or involvement in criminal activity.
- G. <u>Procedural Justice:</u> the way officers and other legal authorities interact with the public and how the characteristics of those interactions shape the public's trust of the police
- H. <u>Probable Cause:</u> is defined as more than bare suspicion; it exists when the facts and circumstances within the officer's knowledge and of which they have reasonably trustworthy information are sufficient

in themselves to warrant a person of reasonable caution to believe that an offense has been or is being committed.

- Race: a category of people of a particular decent, including Caucasian, African, Hispanic, Asian, Middle Eastern, or Native American descent. As distinct from ethnicity, race refers only to physical characteristics sufficiently distinctive to group people under a classification.
- J. <u>Racial Profiling:</u> a law enforcement-initiated action based on an individual's race, ethnicity or national origin rather than on the individual's behavior or on information identifying the individual as having engaged in criminal activity. The term is not relevant as it pertains to witnesses, complainants, persons needing assistance, or other citizen contacts.
 - 1. Examples of racial profiling include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. Citing a driver because of the cited driver's race, ethnicity, or national origin; or
 - detaining the driver of a vehicle based on the determination that a person of that race, ethnicity, or national origin is unlikely to own or possesses that specific make or model of vehicle; or
 - detaining an individual based upon the determination that a person of that race, ethnicity, or national origin does not belong in a specific part of town or a specific place
- K. <u>Reasonable Suspicion</u> is defined as specific, articulable facts leading a reasonable police officer to believe that a person has committed, is committing, or may be about to commit a crime. Reasonable suspicion is less than probable cause, but more than a mere hunch. Reasonable grounds for suspicion depend on the circumstances in each case. There must be an objective basis for that suspicion based on facts, information, and/or intelligence.
- L. Sex: a biological classification, male or female, based on physical and genetic characteristics.
- M. <u>Search:</u> an examination or exploration of an individual's house, premises, vehicle or person to discover stolen property, contraband or other items that may be evidence of a crime.
- N. <u>Search incident to arrest:</u> a full search of an arrested person and of the vicinity around him or her. The search is conducted for officer safety and to prevent the destruction of evidence.
- O. <u>Consent search:</u> a search permitted by a person with apparent authority to allow the search. To be valid, consent must be voluntary and intelligent, based on a totality of circumstances. Voluntary means that the consent was not forced or coerced. Intelligent means the person giving consent must know what he or she is doing.
- P. <u>Inventory:</u> an administrative process by which items of property in an impounded vehicle are listed and secured. An inventory is not a search and should not be used as a substitute for a search. The specific objectives of an inventory are to protect the property of the defendant, to protect the police against any claim of lost property, and to protect police personnel and others from any dangerous instruments.

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- Q. <u>Pedestrian Stop:</u> an interaction between a peace officer and an individual traveling on foot who is being detained for the purpose of a criminal investigation in which the individual is not under arrest.
- R. <u>Traffic Stop:</u> vehicle stops whereas a peace officer stops a motor vehicle for an alleged violation of law or ordinance regulating traffic.

SECTION 4 PROCEDURES

A. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Officers are prohibited from engaging in racial or bias-based profiling or stopping, detaining, searching, arresting, or taking any enforcement action including seizure or forfeiture activities, against any person based solely on the person's race, ethnic background, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, cultural group, or any other identifiable group. These characteristics, however, may form part of reasonable suspicion or probable cause when officers are seeking a suspect with one or more of these attributes.
- 2. Investigative detentions, traffic stops, arrests, searches, and property seizures by officers will be based on a standard of reasonable suspicion or probably cause in accordance with the Fourth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. Officers must be able to articulate specific facts and circumstances that support reasonable suspicion or probable cause for investigative detentions, traffic stops, pedestrian stops, arrests, nonconsensual searches, and property seizures. Except as provided in number three (3) below, officers shall not consider race/ethnicity in establishing either reasonable suspicion or probably cause. Similarly, except as provided below, officers shall not consider race/ethnicity in deciding to initiate even those nonconsensual encounters that do not amount to legal detentions or to request consent to search.
- 3. Officers may take into account the reported race or ethnicity of a specific suspect or suspects based on trustworthy, locally relevant information that links a person or persons of a specific race/ethnicity to a particular unlawful incident(s). Race/ethnicity can never be used as the sole basis for probable cause or reasonable suspicion. Reasonable suspicion or probable cause shall form the basis for any enforcement actions or decisions. Individuals shall be subjected to stops, seizures, or detentions only upon reasonable suspicion that they have committed, are committing, or are about to commit an offense. Officers shall document the elements of reasonable suspicion and probable cause in appropriate reports.
- Officers shall observe all constitutional safeguards and shall respect the constitutional rights of all persons.
 - As traffic stops furnish a primary source of bias-related complaints, officers shall have a firm understanding of the warrantless searches allowed by law, particularly the use of consent. How the officer disengages from a traffic stop may be crucial to a person's perception of fairness or discrimination.
 - Officers shall not use the refusal or lack of cooperation to justify a search of the person or vehicle or a prolonged detention once reasonable suspicion has been dispelled.

- 5. All personnel shall treat everyone with the same courtesy and respect that they would have others observe to department personnel. To this end, personnel are reminded that the exercise of courtesy and respect engenders a future willingness to cooperate with law enforcement.
 - Personnel shall facilitate an individual's access to other governmental services whenever possible, and shall actively provide referrals to other appropriate agencies.
 - b. All personnel shall courteously accept, document, and forward to the Chief of Police any complaints made by an individual against the department. Further, officers shall provide information on the complaint's process and shall give copies of "How to Make a Complaint" when appropriate.
- When feasible, personnel shall offer explanations of the reasons for enforcement actions or other decisions that bear on the individual's well-being unless the explanation would undermine an investigation or jeopardize an officer's safety.
- 7. When concluding an encounter, personnel shall thank him or her for cooperating.
- 8. When feasible, all personnel shall identify themselves by name. When a person requests the information, personnel shall give their departmental identification number, name of the immediate supervisor, or any other reasonable information.
- 9. All personnel are accountable for their actions. Personnel shall justify their actions when required.

B. SUPERVISORY RESPONSIBILITIES

- Supervisors shall be held accountable for the observance of constitutional safeguards during the
 performance of their duties. Supervisors shall identify and correct instances of bias in the work of
 their subordinates.
- Supervisors shall use the disciplinary mechanisms of the department to ensure compliance with this order and the constitutional requirements of law enforcement.
- Supervisors shall be mindful that in accounting for the actions and performance of subordinates, supervisors are key to maintaining community trust in law enforcement. Supervisors shall continually reinforce the ethic of impartial enforcement of the laws, and shall ensure that personnel, by their actions, maintain the community's trust in law enforcement.
- 4. Supervisors are reminded that biased enforcement of the laws engenders not only mistrust of law enforcement, but increases safety risks to personnel. Lack of control over bias also exposes the department to liability consequences.
- Supervisors shall be held accountable for repeated instances of biased enforcement of their subordinates.
- Supervisors shall ensure that all enforcement actions are duly documented per departmental policy. Supervisors shall ensure that all reports show adequate documentation of reasonable suspicion and probable cause, if applicable.

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7. Supervisors shall facilitate the filing of any complaints about law- enforcement service.

C. DISCIPLINARY CONSEQUENCES

- 1. Failure to report any observed or known violations of this policy by any police department employee shall result in corrective action being taken against the employee.
- Officers found in violation of this policy or who have a sustained racial profiling complaint shall be subject to corrective action which may include, diversity, sensitivity, or other appropriate training, counseling, a written reprimand, suspension from duty with or without pay, indefinite suspension, or other appropriate action as determined by the Chief of Police.

D. COMPLAINTS

- Any person may file a complaint with the department if they believe they have been stopped or searched on the basis of their race, ethnicity, national origin, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age cultural group, gender or any other identifiable group. No person shall be discouraged, intimidated, or coerced from filing such a complaint, or discriminated against because they have filed such a complaint.
- 2. A complaint from a citizen regarding racial profiling may be made to any police department supervisor or, if available, to the Office of Professional Responsibility. A complaint from a citizen can be made by writing a letter, calling the police department and requesting a police supervisor to their location (inside the city limits) or by coming to the police station. If, after discussing the complaint with a supervisor the citizen wishes to file a formal complaint they must complete and sign a formal written complaint. All complaints received shall be forwarded in writing through the chain of command to the Chief of Police.
- 3. In addition to the formal written complaint, the supervisor receiving the complaint shall complete a memo and obtain the digital video from the officer's vehicle. The supervisor shall label the digital video, indicating the unit number and date and time the video was pulled from the unit. The video will be forwarded with the written formal complaint and the supervisor's memo through the chain of command to the Chief of Police by the end of the supervisor's tour of duty. All videos of incidents alleging racial or gender profiling shall be retained with the investigative file.
- 4. The Chief of Police will then assign the complaint to an appropriate department supervisor or the Office of Professional Responsibility to investigate the complaint.
- 5. The department shall provide education to the public concerning the complaint process. Written information regarding how a citizen may file a complaint or issue a commendation for an officer shall be made available to the public at a variety of locations, including public meetings, in the lobby of the public safety building and City Hall. This information shall also be available on the department's website (www.lancaster-tx.com).

E. CITATION, DATA COLLECTION AND REPORTING

- 1. Each officer shall be required to collect information relating to all motor vehicle traffic stops by documenting the required information on a traffic citation or a written warning. All self-initiated traffic stops made whether or not a citation or written warning is issued, the officer shall complete a racial profiling incident report in the Racial Profiling Module. The racial profiling incident report can be completed through the use of the in car computer program Visual MCT, a computer at the Lancaster Police station with the computer program MOBLAN or RMS or at the jail through Visual MCT, MOBLAND or RMS.
- 2. The officer will document the following information in the Racial Profiling Module following a motor vehicle stop:
 - a. the date and time of the stop;
 - b. the duration of the stop;
 - c. whether the stop was video recorded;
 - d. the location of the stop;
 - e. the stopped subject's gender;
 - f. the stopped subject's race or ethnicity;
 - g. if the stopped subject's race or ethnicity was known prior to the stop;
 - the residency status of the stopped subject;
 - i. the type of stop;
 - the reason for the stop;
 - k. if a search was conducted:
 - I. the authority of the search;
 - m. if any type of illegal contraband was located during the search;
 - n. the result of the stop; and
 - any charges filed
 - p. If physical force resulted in bodily injury used during stop:
- 3. Once an officer has completed the racial profiling incident report it should be submitted into the Records Management System. Officers should complete and submit all required racial profiling incident report(s) by the end of their duty shift unless the officer receive permission to turn the report(s) in the following day from their direct supervisor. If permission is granted by the officer's

direct supervisor, the officer should complete and submit the report(s) by the end of their next duty shift.

- 4. By March of each year, the department shall submit a written report to the City Council that includes the information gathered from the traffic stops in the preceding calendar year. The report will include:
 - a breakdown of traffic stops by race and ethnicity;
 - the number of traffic stops that resulted in a search and the basis for the searches;
 - the number of searches that resulted in contraband being discovered and, if so, the type of contraband; and
 - d. the number of traffic stops that resulted in custodial arrests
- 5. The Operations Division Assistant Chief of Police shall be responsible for providing a report to the Chief of Police that contains this information.

F. RACIAL PROFILING TRAINING

- Officers are responsible to adhere to all Texas Commission on Law Enforcement training and the Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas (LEMIT) requirements as mandated by law.
- 2. All officers shall complete Texas Commission on Law Enforcement training and education program on racial profiling not later than the second anniversary of the date the officer is licensed under Chapter 1701, Texas Occupation Code, or the date the officer applies for an intermediate proficiency certificate, whichever date is earlier. At the discretion of the Chief of Police, additional diversity and sensitivity training may be required for officers with sustained racial profiling or other discrimination complaints filed against them.
- The Chief of Police, as part of the initial training and continued education for such appointment, will be required to attend the Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas program on racial profiling.
- 4. Supervisors shall conduct periodic roll call training regarding racial profiling issues, including implementation and enforcement of this policy.

G. SCOPE OF RESPONSIBILITY

- 1. All members of the department shall know and comply with all aspects of this directive.
- 2. All Division Commanders and supervisory personnel are responsible for ensuring compliance with the provisions and intent of this directive.



A Citizens Guide to the Commendation & Complaint Process

What Happens When I Complain About a Police Department Employee?

The Lancaster Police Department requires that all of its police officers and employees maintain the highest standard of conduct and service.

Who Investigates the Complaint?

All complaints are investigated thoroughly by the Internal Affairs Department. If a complaint is found to be valid, the Chief of Police will take steps to insure that any deficiencies are corrected.

How Do I File a Complaint?

You may call, write a letter, or come to the police department and talk to one of the police department supervisors. If, after discussing your complaint with a supervisor, you wish to have a formal investigation, you will need to complete and sign a formal complaint form. The form may be turned in to any supervisor 24 hours a day or may be turned in to the Records counter at the Lancaster Police Department, Monday through Friday from 8am to 5pm. Contact may be made with Internal Affairs at 972-218-2700 or lpd@lancaster-tx.com

Can People Under 18 Years of Age File a Complaint?

Yes. However, we require that one of your parents or guardians accompany you.

What Will Happen to the Officer or Employee?

It will depend on what the employee did or did not do. If the employee's actions were criminal, he or she could face the same consequences as any other citizen. If the actions were improper but not criminal, the Chief of Police may discipline the employee. The discipline can range from additional training, counseling, oral reprimand, written reprimand, suspension from duty or termination from employment. When administering discipline, the Chief of Police considers the severity of the complaint and the past performance of the employee.

What Happens After the Complaint is Filed?

You will receive a letter, an e-mail, or a phone call from the Investigator assigned to your complaint as soon as possible, advising you of the disposition of your complaint.

Are There Any Complaints That Will Not Be Investigated?

The Lancaster Police Department will not investigate the lawfulness of any arrest or citation. The guilt or innocence of any criminal charge or traffic citation is determined only in court. If your complaint alleges that you were not advised of your Miranda Rights, this issue is also advised in court. The Lancaster Police Department will not investigate any complaint received 45 days after the incident that gave rise to the complaint

Background:

At the City Council work session held on February 20, 2023, Council received a presentation from FORVIS LLP, CPAs & Advisors, the independent certified public accounting firm that performed the annual audit of the City of Lancaster's general government and its component units.

This item is to formally accept the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2022. The City engaged the independent certified public accounting firm FORVIS LLP, CPAs & Advisors, to perform the annual audit of the City of Lancaster and its component units for the eighth consecutive year. The audit fieldwork began in November 2022 and concluded in February 2023.

Operational Considerations:

The ACFR is distributed to numerous financial institutions, bond rating agencies, the City's financial advisors, and grantors to comply with financial disclosure requirements. This report is designed to provide readers with an understanding of the financial status of the City and its results of operations. The City received a clean audit with no findings and no comments.

Legal Considerations:

The City Attorney has reviewed and approved the resolution, as to form.

Public Information Considerations:

This item is being considered at a Regular Meeting of the City Council noticed in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Fiscal Impact:

The annual audit was prepared in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles accepted in the United States (GAAP). The audit was also prepared in compliance with accounting principles accepted by (GASB) Government Accounting Standards Board. The information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements.

To the Honorable Mayor, Members of City Council and Citizens of the City of Lancaster, Texas:

We hereby issue the annual comprehensive financial report of the City of Lancaster, Texas (City) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2022. State law requires that every municipality publish within six months of the close of each year a complete set of audited financial statements, to include the auditor's opinion on the statements, and this report fulfills that requirement.

This report consists of City management's representations concerning the finances of the City. Consequently, management assumes full responsibility for the completeness and reliability of all of the information presented in the report. To provide a reasonable basis for making these representations, management of the City has established a comprehensive internal control framework that is designed both to protect the government's assets from loss, theft, or misuse and to compile sufficient reliable information for the preparation of the City's financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Because the cost of internal controls should not outweigh their benefits, the City's comprehensive framework of internal controls has been designed to provide reasonable rather than absolute assurance that the financial statements will be free from material misstatement. Management assumes full responsibility for the completeness and reliability of the information contained in this report, based upon a comprehensive framework of internal control that it has established for this purpose.

As management, we assert that, to the best of our knowledge and belief, this financial report is complete and reliable in all material respects.

The City's financial statements have been audited by **FORVIS**, **LLP**, independent auditors. The goal of the independent audit is to provide reasonable assurance that the financial statements of the City for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2022, are free of material misstatement. The independent audit involved examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management; and evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

The independent auditor concluded, based upon the audit, that there was a reasonable basis for rendering an unmodified (clean) opinion that the City's financial statements for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2022, are fairly presented in accordance with GAAP. The independent auditor's report is presented as the first component of the financial section of this report.

GAAP requires that management provide a narrative introduction, overview, and analysis to accompany the basic financial statements in the form of Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A). This letter of transmittal is designed to complement MD&A and should be read in conjunction with it. The City's MD&A can be found immediately following the report of the independent auditors.







Profile

Located in Southwest Dallas County, the City of Lancaster is situated just minutes from downtown Dallas. Adjacent to I-35 on its western border and I-20 on its northern boundary, the City covers approximately 33.13 square miles, and serves an estimated 2022 population of 41,560. The City is a political subdivision and municipal corporation of the State, duly organized and existing under the laws of the State and is a home-rule city operating under a Council/Manager form of government. The Council is comprised of the Mayor and six Council members, who enact local legislation, adopt budgets, determine policies, and appoint the City Manager, City Secretary, City Attorney and Judge of the municipal court. The City Manager is the chief administrative officer for the City and is responsible for the daily management of the City. Major services provided under general government and enterprise functions are: public safety (police and fire protection), emergency medical services, construction and maintenance of streets, water and sewer delivery services, parks, recreation, library services and general administrative services.

Accounting System and Budgetary Control

One of the objectives of the City's financial accounting system is to provide adequate internal controls. Internal controls are designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance regarding the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a control should not exceed the benefits likely to be derived, and the evaluation of costs and benefits requires estimates and judgments by management. We believe that the City's internal controls adequately safeguard assets and provide reasonable assurance of proper recording of financial transactions.

The City's accounting records for general governmental operations are maintained on a modified accrual basis, with revenues being recorded when available and measurable and expenditures being recorded when the services or goods are received, and the liabilities are incurred.

Accounting records for the City's enterprise activities are maintained on the accrual basis.

The City of Lancaster has adopted a comprehensive set of financial policies. During the current year the City updated its debt policy to include the GFOA recommendation to prohibit the City from investing in derivatives.

The government-wide financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting and the economic resources measurement focus. Government-wide financial statements do not provide information by fund, but distinguish between the City's governmental activities, business-type activities, and activities of its discretely presented component units on the statement of net position and statement of activities.

Budgetary Controls: The budgetary process begins each year with the preparation of both current and proposed revenue estimates by the City's administrative and financial management staff and expenditure estimates provided by each City department. Budgets are reviewed by the administrative and management staff which consists of the City Manager's office and department directors and managers. The City Manager makes final decisions and submits a recommended budget to the City Council. The proposed budget is reviewed by the City Council, a process which includes public hearing, in addition to work sessions which are open to the public. State law requires adoption of the City budget no later than the 30th day of September.

The objective of the budgetary controls maintained by the City is to ensure compliance with legal provisions embodied in the annual budget approved by the City Council. Activities of the general fund and water and sewer fund are included in the annual budget and are appropriated annually. The level of budgetary control (that is, the level at which expenditures cannot legally exceed the appropriated amounts) is established by departments within the individual fund. The City Manager is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between line items and departments within any fund; however, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the City Council.

Monthly departmental expenditure reports are generated by an automated accounting system and provide expenditure totals and encumbrances at the line-item level for the most recently completed month as well as the year-to-date total, and an actual versus budgeted rate of expenditure. Major expenditure requests are approved by the City Manager prior to the encumbrance of funds.

Relevant Financial Policies

The City has established a policy to have a balanced budget and to maintain a reserve account of 18 percent of budgeted expenditures. In fiscal year 2022, the General Fund accomplished this by having an unassigned fund balance of \$6,898,290 which meets the reserve minimum requirements of 12 percent of the operating budget.

The City also has a long-range planning policy to identify major issues when developing its fiscal year budget. A five-year budget analysis of all City funds is developed to provide an understanding of the long-term impact of budget decisions. The fiscal year 2022 budget was prepared along with a planning budget for fiscal years 2023-26.

Cash Management Policies and Practices: The City's current bank depository contract is with JP Morgan Chase. The City's investment policy is to minimize credit and market risks while maintaining a competitive yield on its portfolio. The City's investment strategies include using cash flow analysis to purchase securities; however, cash temporarily idle during the year was invested in three public funds investment pools – TexPool, LOGIC and Texas CLASS. This practice allows for a diversified balanced approach to changing interest rates. Investments in the deferred compensation plans are held by the third-party plan administrators. The investment policy is annually updated and approved by the Council in compliance with the Texas Public Funds Investment Act.

Pension and other post-employment benefit:

The City participates in the Texas Municipal Retirement System (TMRS), an agency authorized by the State of Texas. Employees of the City contribute seven percent of their gross pay and the City offers a 2:1 match. TMRS participants are immediately vested in those funds they contribute plus allocated interest. Participants are vested in employer contributions after five years of credited participation. If participants withdraw from TMRS prior to five years of credited participation, they may withdraw from TMRS those funds they contributed plus interest earnings. The City also provides postretirement health and dental care benefits for certain retirees and their dependents at the retiree's expense. As of the current fiscal year, there were seven retired employees receiving these benefits. Additional information on the City's pension arrangements and post-employment benefits can be found in the notes to the basic financial statements.

Local Economy

Lancaster's growing economy continues to be greatly influenced by the attraction of light manufacturing, fulfillment and logistics companies to the community. Currently, over five million square feet of industrial/distribution space is under construction or approved for construction including two large Walmart facilities, a Niagara Bottling plant, a McKinley Packaging manufacturing plant, a new manufacturing facility for American Licorice and several large industrial/distribution facilities. An additional five million square feet of industrial/regional headquarters/distribution space was recently occupied including: the million square foot regional headquarters for DSV Logistics, a new research and testing facility for Waymo, a new manufacturing facility for DW Distribution, and a new ThredUp facility planning to employ two thousand workers. The companies will join several existing national companies with facilities in Lancaster including but not limited to: Quaker/PepsiCo, BMW, Curt Manufacturing, United Natural Foods, Inc., ICU Medical, Mars Petcare, Petmate, Wayfair, Mobis Parts America, Georgia Pacific, Fisher Paykel, Boise Cascade, Oak Creek Homes, AT&T, Oncor, Swift Transportation, Inc., BASF, LGS Technologies, Texas Nameplate, Brenntag, CMOP, and Brasscraft.

The new development will nearly double Lancaster's supply of industrial space from thirteen million square feet in 2018 to an estimated twenty-five million square feet in 2025. In addition, Lancaster offers approximately three thousand acres of undeveloped land zoned for manufacturing/distribution uses that is ready for development. This vacant land can accommodate over forty million additional square feet of industrial/distribution space. The interest in development in the community remains high and is expected to continue over the next three to five years.

The City's unemployment rate at the 2022 fiscal year end was 6.1 percent, down from the 2021 fiscal year end rate of 7.5 percent and the pandemic high of 15.3 percent. The City of Lancaster benefits from its easily accessible location in the Dallas-Fort Worth region, fifteen miles south of downtown Dallas and situated between three interstate highways – I-35E, I-20 and I-45. The City's location between the 3 interstate freeways and State Highway Loop 9 (under construction) has been referred to as the Golden Box. Lancaster is rapidly becoming an employment hub for the area. The City's location and the close proximity to job opportunities in Dallas, Fort Worth and the region also contribute to growth in the City. Lancaster is part of the Best Southwest Partnership, which includes Lancaster, Cedar Hill, DeSoto, and Duncanville.

The 2022 Census population for Lancaster is 41,560 people, an increase of 14.0 percent over the 2010 Census and 60.5 percent over the 2000 Census. Lancaster still contains a large amount of undeveloped residential land, approximately only 50 percent of the City's 33.13 square miles of land are currently developed. Recent platting and residential construction activity indicate that this trend will continue.

In fiscal year 2022, the overall taxable value of property in the Lancaster was up 21.9 percent over the fiscal year 2021 value. Commercial and business personal property grew at a higher rate (29.5 percent increase) than residential property (26.5 percent increase). Tax exempt property valuations grew 54.7% year over year resulting in an overall city net taxable value increase of 21.9% increase

Sales tax collections in fiscal year 2022 were sharply above fiscal year 2021 levels – 45.8 percent increase (\$5,723,099 increase over fiscal year 2021 collections). Much of the sales tax growth was from sales tax paid on construction (related to large amount of industrial construction activity).

Major Initiatives

Annually, the City Council has adopted goals aimed at guiding Lancaster's future growth and development. For fiscal year 2022-2023, included initiatives are:

- Financially Sound Government;
- Professional & Committed City Workforce;
- Healthy, Safe & Engaged Community;
- Quality Development;
- Sound Infrastructure.

Awards and Acknowledgements

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) awarded a Certification of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the City of Lancaster, Texas for its annual comprehensive financial report (ACFR) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2021. The City has received a Certification of Achievement for seven consecutive years. In order to be awarded a Certificate of Achievement, the City of Lancaster, Texas had to publish an easily readable and efficiently organized ACFR that satisfied both generally accepted accounting principles and applicable program requirements.

A Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting is valid for a period of one year only. We are submitting the September 30, 2022 report to the GFOA to determine eligibility for another certificate.

The preparation of this report on a timely basis could not be accomplished without the efficient and dedicated services of the City's staff. In particular, we would like to recognize and express our heartfelt appreciation to all members of the Finance Department, who all worked diligently to assist and contribute to the preparation of this report. The Mayor and the City Council are to be commended for their willingness to participate in the strategic planning process for financial operations, and for their commitment to




Organizational Chart

Independent Auditor's Report

The Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council City of Lancaster, Texas

Opinions

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Lancaster, Texas (City) as of and for the year ended September 30, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City as of September 30, 2022, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the "Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements" section of our report. We are required to be independent of the City, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the City's ability to continue as a going concern for 12 months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.



Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, budgetary comparison, pension and other postemployment benefit information, as listed on the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements. The supplementary information including the combining and individual fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information included in the annual comprehensive financial report. The other information comprises the introductory section and statistical sections but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinions on the basic financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion or any form of assurance thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited) September 30, 2022

Introduction

The Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) section presents a narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the City of Lancaster, Texas (City) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2022. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the City's financial statements, which follow this section.

Financial Highlights

- The assets and deferred outflows of resources of the City exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources at the end of fiscal year 2022, resulting in \$175,325,058 of net position. Net position associated with governmental activities is \$89,940,004, or 51 percent of the total net position of the City. Net position associated with business-type activities is \$85,385,054, or 49 percent of the total net position of the City. The largest portion of net position consists of net investment in capital assets, which is \$79,780,443.
- Unrestricted net position, which may be used to meet the City's future obligations, consists of \$65,882,656, or 38 percent of the City's total net position. Unrestricted net position for governmental activities is \$22,655,727, or 25 percent of total net position for governmental activities. Unrestricted net position for business-type activities is \$43,226,929 or 51 percent of total net position for business-type activities.
- As of the close of fiscal year 2022, the City's Governmental Funds reported a combined ending fund balance of \$62,307,980, an increase of \$12,839,662 from the prior year.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, unassigned fund balance for the General Fund was \$6,898,290. This represents approximately 19 percent of General Fund expenditures.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the City's basic financial statements. The City's basic financial statements are comprised of three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements and (3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains required and other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-Wide Financial Statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the City's finances, in a manner similar to private-sector business.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the City's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the City is improving or deteriorating.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited) September 30, 2022

The statement of activities presents information showing how the City's net position changed during the most recent fiscal year. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods, for example uncollected taxes and earned, but not used, vacation leave.

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the City that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges (business-type activities). The governmental activities of the City include general administration, public safety, public works, drainage systems, library, human resources and finance. The business-type activities of the City include water and sewer, airport operations, refuse and golf course operations.

The government-wide financial statements include the Economic Development Corporation and the Recreational Development Corporation as part of its reporting entity as discretely presented component units. Discrete presentation entails reporting component unit financial data in columns separate from the financial data of the primary government. The Lancaster Economic Development Corporation and the Lancaster Recreational Development Corporation are legally separate entities.

Fund Financial Statements. A *fund* is defined as a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and other financial resources, together with all related liabilities and residual equities or balances, and changes therein, which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions, or limitations. Some funds are required to be established by state law and by bond covenants. The City Council also establishes other funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes or to show that it is meeting legal responsibilities when using certain taxes, grants, or other money. The City's two kinds of funds – Governmental and Proprietary – utilize different accounting approaches.

Governmental Funds. The majority of the City's basic services are reported in Governmental Funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method identified as the modified accrual basis of accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can be readily converted to cash. The Governmental Fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the City's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental Fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the City's programs.

By comparing information presented for Governmental Funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. The relationships, or differences between governmental activities (reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities) and Governmental Funds, are detailed in a reconciliation following the fund financial statements.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited) September 30, 2022

Information is presented separately in the accompanying Governmental Funds Balance Sheet and in the accompanying Governmental Funds Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances for the General Fund, Debt Service Fund, Capital Projects Fund, and ARPA Fund all of which are considered to be major funds. Data from the other Governmental Funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for each of these Non-major Governmental Funds is provided in the form of combining statements elsewhere in this report.

Proprietary Funds. The City charges customers for the services it provides, whether to outside customers or to other units within the City. These services are generally reported in Proprietary Funds. Proprietary Funds are reported in the same way that all activities are reported in the accompanying Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities. The City's Enterprise Funds (a component of Proprietary Funds) are identical to the business-type activities reported in the government-wide statements, but provide information, such as cash flows.

The City maintains an Enterprise Fund to account for: (1) water and sewer services provided to the City's retail and wholesale customers, (2) trash collection and disposal services, (3) operation of the City's airport, and (4) operation of the City's golf course. All activities associated with providing such services are accounted for in these funds, including administration, operation, maintenance, debt service, capital improvements, billing, and collection. The City's intent is that the cost of providing the services to the general public on a continuing basis is financed through user charges in a manner similar to a private-sector business enterprise.

Notes to the Financial Statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

Other Information. In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information concerning the City's progress in funding its obligations. Required supplementary information immediately follows the notes to the financial statements. Combining statements for Non-major Governmental Funds, Enterprise Funds, and component units fund financial statements follow the section of required supplementary information.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. As of September 30, 2022, City assets and deferred outflows of resources exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows resulting in \$175,325,058 of net position.

By far, the largest portion of the City's net position (46 percent) reflects its investment in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings, machinery, equipment, vehicles, and infrastructure), less any related outstanding debt that was used to acquire those assets. The City uses these capital assets to provide a variety of services to its citizens. Accordingly, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the City's investment in capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources used to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

An additional portion of the City's net position (17 percent) represents resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used. The remaining balance of \$65,882,656 is unrestricted and may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to its citizens and creditors.

Analysis of City's Operations. The following table provides a summary of the City's operations for the year ended September 30, 2022. Overall, the City had an increase in net position of \$19,273,858.

Governmental Activities. Governmental activities increased the City's net position by \$15,221,743. Total revenue for the governmental activities (excluding transfers) increased from the previous year by \$6,647,939. General revenue had a net increase of \$6,491,139. Property tax collections increased as a result of new business and property additions as well as due to recent real property reappraisals.

Business-type Activities. Net position from business-type activities increased by \$4,052,115. Total revenue for the business-type activities increased from the previous year by \$3,800,677 primarily due to an increase in charges for services revenue.

Financial Analysis of the City's Funds

Governmental Funds

The focus of the City's Governmental Funds is to provide information on near term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the City's financing requirements. In particular, unassigned fund balance may serve as a useful measure of the government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

As of the end of the current fiscal year, the City's Governmental Funds reported a combined ending fund balance of \$62,307,980, an increase of \$12,839,662 from the prior year. This amount includes fund balance committed for \$20,075,173 due to adoption of ordinances approved by City Council for special projects. The City has fund balance assigned by the City Manager of \$4,231,873. The City also has fund balance restrictions for court, capital projects, debt service, public works, public improvement districts, police, tourism, law enforcement, parkland dedication, and street maintenance for a total of \$30,944,175. The net unassigned fund balance was \$6,898,290. Components of the net increase of the total fund balance are:

- The General Fund recorded a net increase in fund balance of \$8,200,802, primarily related to increased property and sales tax revenue.
- Capital Projects Fund recorded a net increase in fund balance of \$1,329,331, primarily related to increased impact fees.
- General Obligation Debt Service Fund recorded a net increase in fund balance of \$1,227,783, primarily related to taxes.
- ARPA Fund recorded a net decrease in fund balance of \$555, primarily related to grants.

Proprietary Funds

The City's proprietary funds provide the same type of information found in the government-wide financial statements. Unrestricted net position of the Water and Sewer Fund at the end of the fiscal year amounted to \$40,867,931, the Airport Fund reported an unrestricted net position of (\$1,669,464) and the Golf Fund reported an unrestricted net position of (\$1,518,057).

Capital Assets

The City's capital assets for its governmental and business-type activities as of September 30, 2022, amount to \$146,824,954 (net of accumulated depreciation). This net investment in capital assets includes land, buildings, park facilities, roads, bridges and water and sewer lines.

Additional information on capital asset activity can be found in *Note* 7 of this report.

At the end of the current fiscal year, the City had total bonds outstanding of \$63,130,000, all being tax supported. The City also has \$1,884,854 of debt through financed purchases.

The City has an Aa3 rating from Moody's Investors Service and an AA rating from Standard and Poor's.

Economic Factor and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

In the fiscal year 2023 budget, General Fund revenues are budgeted to increase by 10 percent from the 2022 budget year. The budget increase is the direct result of increased property and sales tax revenue.

Property taxes make up about 60 percent of budgeted revenues and sales tax make up about 19 percent of budgeted revenues.

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting and reporting policies of the City of Lancaster (City) conform to the generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) applicable to state and local governments. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standards setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The following is a summary of the more significant accounting policies.

Reporting Entity

The City was incorporated in 1853. The City operates as a home-rule city, under a Council-manager form of government and provides the following services as authorized by its charter: public safety (police and fire), highways and streets, water and sewer utilities, sanitation, health and social services, parks and recreation, public improvements, airport, golf course, planning and zoning and general administrative services.

The City's basic financial statements include the separate governmental entities that are controlled by or are dependent on the City. The determination to include separate governmental entities is based on the criteria of GASB Statement No. 14, The Financial Reporting Entity (GASB 14), as amended by GASB Statement No.39, Determining Whether Certain Organizations Are Component Units and GASB Statement No. 61, The Financial Reporting Entity: Omnibus. GASB 14 defines the reporting entity as the primary government and those component units for which the primary government is financially accountable. To be financially accountable, a voting majority of the component unit's board must be appointed by the primary government, and either: (1) the primary government must be able to impose its will or (2) the primary government may potentially benefit financially or be financially responsible for the component unit. The Lancaster Economic Development Corporation (Economic) and the Lancaster Recreational Development Corporation (Recreational) are nonprofit industrial development corporations formed in July and October 1995, respectively, under the Development Corporation Act of 1979. Both Economic and Recreational are organized exclusively for the purposes of benefiting and accomplishing public purposes and to act on behalf of the City. This includes the construction and renovation of municipal buildings, the acquisition, improvement, and operation of parks as well as other economic development purposes. The affairs of these corporations are managed by two separate Boards of Directors, which are appointed by the City Council. The City Council approves annual budgets and issuances of debt. Economic and Recreational have been discretely presented in the accompanying financial statements. Separate stand-alone financial statements of the individual component units are not available.

Basis of Presentation

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the activities of the City. The effect of interfund activity, within the governmental and business-type activities columns, has been removed from these statements. However, interfund services provided and used are not eliminated in the consolidation process. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The statement of net position presents information on all the City's assets, deferred outflows of resources, and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources, with the difference reported as "net position." Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the City is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given program are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific program of City government. *Program revenues* include: (1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given program and (2) operating or capital grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Taxes and other items properly not included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

The City segregates transactions related to certain functions or activities in separate funds in order to aid financial management and to demonstrate legal compliance. Separate statements are presented for Governmental Funds and Proprietary Funds. These statements present each major fund as a separate column on the fund financial statements; all non-major funds are aggregated and presented in a single column.

Governmental Funds are those funds through which most governmental functions typically are financed. The measurement focus of Governmental Funds is on the sources, uses and balances of current financial resources. The City has presented the following major Governmental Funds:

General Fund – The General Fund is the main operating fund of the City. This fund is used to account for all financial resources not accounted for in other funds. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not restricted by law or contractual agreement to some other funds are accounted for in this fund. General operating expenditures, fixed charges and capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds are paid from the General Fund.

Capital Projects Fund – The Capital Projects Fund is utilized to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

General Obligation Debt Service Fund – The Debt Service Fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources and for the payment of general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs, as well as the payment of lease/purchase items. The revenue source is principally advalorem taxes levied by the City and transfers in for the payment of lease/purchases.

ARPA Fund – The ARPA Fund is utilized to account for financial resources and related expenditures from the *America Rescue Plan Act of 2021*.

Proprietary Funds are accounted for using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The accounting objectives are determinations of net income, financial position, and cash flow. All assets, deferred outflows, and inflows of resources and liabilities are included on the Statement of Net Position. The City has presented the following major Proprietary Funds:

Water and Sewer Fund – The Water and Sewer Fund is used to account for the acquisition, operation, and maintenance of a municipal water and sewer utility, supported primarily by user charges to the public.

Airport Fund – The Airport Fund is used to account for the operation of the City's regional airport.

Golf Course Fund – The Golf Fund is used to account for the operation of the City's golf course.

Proprietary Funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from nonoperating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a Proprietary Fund's principal ongoing operations. Operating expenses for the Proprietary Funds include the cost of personnel and contractual services, supplies, and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses.

Fund Balance Flow Assumptions

Sometimes the City will fund outlays for a particular purpose from both restricted and unrestricted resources (the total of committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balance). In order to calculate the amounts to report as restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balance in the governmental fund financial statements, a flow assumption must be made about the order in which the resources are considered to be applied. It is the City's policy to consider restricted fund balance to have been depleted before using any of the components of unrestricted fund balance. Further, when the components of unrestricted fund balance can be used for the same purpose, committed fund balance is depleted first, followed by assigned fund balance. Unassigned fund balance is applied last.

Classification of Fund Equity

Fund balances are classified as nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned, or unassigned in governmental funds. Nonspendable fund balance cannot be spent, either because it is not in spendable form or because of legal or contractual requirements. Restricted fund balances have constraints for specific purposes which are externally imposed by providers, such as creditors, grantors, or other governments; or by enabling legislation of the City Council. Committed fund balances can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by the City Council through an ordinance or resolution. Assigned fund balances are constrained by intent to be used for specific purposes but are neither restricted nor committed. Assignments are made by City management based on Council direction. Unassigned fund balances include residual positive fund balances within the General Fund that had not been classified within the other mentioned categories. Unassigned fund balances may also include negative balances for any governmental fund if expenditures exceed amounts restricted, committed or assigned for those specific purposes.

The City has established a policy to maintain a reserve account of 18 percent of budgeted expenditures. As of September 30, 2022, the City was in compliance with this policy as unassigned fund balance in the General Fund was equal to 19 percent of current year expenditures.

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The accounting and financial reporting treatment is determined by the applicable measurement focus and basis of accounting. Measurement focus indicates the type of resources being measured such as current financial resources or economic resources. The basis of accounting indicates the timing of transactions or events for recognition in the financial statements.

The government-wide and proprietary funds financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

The governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available.

Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences, and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due. General capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Issuance of long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Property taxes, sales taxes, franchise taxes, fines and forfeits, and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Licenses and permits, charges for services (except for sanitation services) and rents and concessions are recorded as revenues when received in cash because they are generally not measurable until actually received. Entitlements are recorded as revenues when all eligibility requirements are met, including any time requirements and the amount is received during the period or within the availability period for this revenue source (within 60 days of year-end). Expenditure-driven grants are recognized as revenue when the qualifying expenditures have been incurred and all other eligibility requirements have been met, and the amount is received during the period or within the availability period for this revenue source (within 60 days of year-end). All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the City.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the City considers cash and cash equivalents to be cash and external investment pools.

Investments

Investments in external investment pools are carried at either net asset value or amortized cost, as determined by each pool's individual investment valuation method and whether there is a readily determinable fair value of the pool as of the City's fiscal year end. In instances where pools transact at amortized cost, no readily determinable fair value is deemed available.

Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts

An allowance for uncollectible taxes including penalties and interest and water and sewer billed receivables is provided based on an analysis of historical trends. The allowances at September 30, 2022, were \$750,272 for uncollectible taxes, \$3,540,503 for water, sewer, and stormwater billings, \$507,074 for court fees and fines and \$650,995 for ambulance fees.

Inventory

Inventories, which are recognized as expenditures as they are consumed, are stated at cost (first-in, first-out). Inventories consist of expendable supplies.

Prepaid Items

Prepaid balances, which are recognized as expenditures as they are consumed, are for payments made by the City in the current year for services occurring in the subsequent year.

Interfund Receivables and Payables

Any residual balances outstanding between the governmental activities and business-type activities are reported in the government-wide financial statements as "internal balances."

Interfund Transactions

Interfund services provided and used are accounted for as revenues, expenditures or expenses. Transactions that constitute reimbursements to a fund for expenditures/expenses initially made that are properly applicable to another fund, are recorded as expenditures/expenses in the reimbursing fund and as a reduction of expenditures/expenses in the fund reimbursed. All other interfund transactions, except quasi-external transactions and reimbursements, are recorded as transfers.

Lease Receivable

The City leases a portion of its property to various businesses who use the space to conduct their operations. The City recognizes a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources in the government-wide and governmental fund financial statements.

At the commencement of a lease, the City initially measures the lease receivable at the present value of payments expected to be received during the lease term. Subsequently, the lease receivable is reduced by the principal portion of lease payments received. The deferred inflow of resources is initially measured as the initial amount of the lease receivable, adjusted for lease payments received at or before the lease commencement date. Subsequently, the deferred inflow of resources is recognized as revenue over the life of the lease term.

Key estimates and judgments include how the City determines: (1) the discount rate it uses to discount the expected lease receipts to present value, (2) lease term, and (3) lease receipts.

- The City uses its estimated incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for leases.
- The lease term includes the noncancellable period of the lease. Lease receipts included in the measurement of the lease receivable is composed of fixed payments from the lessee.

The City monitors changes in circumstances that would require a remeasurement of its lease, and will remeasure the lease receivable and deferred inflows of resources if certain changes occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of the lease receivable.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, equipment, and infrastructure assets, are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements and in the fund financial statements for Proprietary Funds. All capital assets are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual historical cost is not available. Donated assets are valued at acquisition value on the date donated. Repairs and maintenance are recorded as expenses. Renewals and betterments are capitalized.

All items purchased with a price of \$5,000 or greater and a useful life exceeding one year is placed on the capital asset list. Each department is required to monitor their inventory and is accountable for the location of the asset. Asset tags are issued after payment has been processed. The Purchasing Agent conducts a yearly inventory to verify the inventory.

Assets capitalized have a useful life of over one year. Depreciation is recorded on each class of depreciable property utilizing the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Estimated useful lives of major categories of property are:

Plants and buildings40 yearsImprovements5-50 yearsMachinery and equipment5-10 years

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element represents a consumption of net assets that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The City has the following items that quality for reporting in this category.

- Deferred loss on refunding A deferred loss on refunding results from the difference in the carrying value of refunded debt and its reacquisition price. This amount is deferred and recognized over the shorter of the life of the refunded or refunding debt.
- Employer Contributions Pensions and OPEB These contributions are those made after the measurement date through the fiscal year end (January 1st September 30th) resulting in a cash outlay not yet recognized in GASB Statement No. 68, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions an amendment of GASB Statement No. 27* (GASB 68) and GASB Statement No. 75, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions* (GASB 75). This amount is deferred and recognized in the following fiscal year.
- Experience difference Pensions and OPEB These amounts represent the difference in expected and actual pension and OPEB experience. These differences are deferred and recognized over the estimated average remaining lives of all members determined as of the measurement date.

 Assumption changes – Pensions and OPEB – These amounts represent the difference resulting from a change in assumptions used to measure the underlying total pension liability and total OPEB liability. These differences are deferred and recognized over the estimated average remaining lives of all members determined as of the beginning of the measurement period.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position or balance sheet will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element represents an acquisition of net assets that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until then.

The City has the following items that qualify for reporting in this category.

- Unavailable revenue This amount represents uncollected property taxes, municipal court fees, ambulance fees, and notes receivables. This amount is deferred and recognized once payments are made in the follow fiscal year. This item is only presented in the Balance Sheet Governmental Funds.
- Experience difference Pensions and OPEB –These amounts represent the difference in expected and actual OPEB experience. These differences are deferred and recognized over the estimated average remaining lives of all members determined as of the measurement date.
- Investment difference Pensions These amounts represent the difference in projected and actual earnings on pension plan assets. These differences are deferred and amortized over a closed five-year period.
- Assumption changes OPEB These amounts represent the difference resulting from a change in assumptions used to measure the underlying total OPEB liability. These differences are deferred and recognized over the estimated average remaining lives of all members determined as of the beginning of the measurement period.
- Lease related this represents the initial value of the lease receivable under GASB 87 systematically reduced and recognized as lease revenue over the term of the lease. This deferred inflow is recorded at both the fund level and government-wide financial statements.

Compensated Absences

Sick leave is recorded on governmental activities for the Fire and Police Departments. All other employees are not compensated for unused sick leave. Vacation is earned in varying amounts up to a maximum of 20 days per year for employees with 10 or more years of service. Unused vacation leave carried forward from one year to the next is limited to 260 hours.

The liability for unused vested vacation leave as of September 30, 2022, is shown as a liability for compensated absences in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide statements and in the fund financial statements for the Proprietary Funds. The amount to be paid from current available financial resources is not considered significant.

Defined Benefit Pension Plans

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the Fiduciary Net Position of the Texas Municipal Retirement System (TMRS) and additions to/deductions from TMRS' Fiduciary Net Position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by TMRS. For this purpose, plan contributions are recognized in the period that compensation is reported for the employee, which is when contributions are legally due. Benefit payments and refunds are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value. Information regarding the City's total pension liability is obtained from TMRS through a report prepared for the City by TMRS' consulting actuary, Gabriel Roeder Smith & Company, in compliance with GASB 68.

Fund allocation of related balances is determined by individual employee assignment. This assignment is uniform with regard to liquidation of the liability.

Defined Benefit Other Postemployment Benefit Plans

The City has two single-employer defined benefit other postemployment benefit (OPEB) plans. For purposes of measuring the total OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to OPEB and OPEB expense have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the Plan. For this purpose, benefit payments are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms.

Allocation of OPEB related balances to reporting units is determined on the basis of employee payroll funding. The total OPEB liability is generally liquidated in the General Fund.

Unearned Revenue

Governmental funds report a liability, unearned revenue, in connection with resources that have been received, but not yet earned.

Adoption of New Accounting Standards

GASB Statement No. 87, *Leases*, establishes new guidance for lease accounting for lessees and lessors and eliminates the classification of leases as either operating or capital leases. This statement establishes a single model for lease accounting based on the principle that leases are financings of the right-to-use an underlying asset. Lessees will recognize a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset. Lessors will recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources. The requirements of this Statement are effective for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2021. The City has implemented this Statement in fiscal year 2022. See *Note 6* for additional information. The adoption of this standard had no material impact on the City's net position.

New Pronouncements

The GASB has issued the following new statements to be implemented in future years.

GASB Statement No. 94, *Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements* (GASB 94):

This statement addresses issues related to public-private and public-public partnership arrangements (PPPs) and availability payment arrangements (APAs). This statement will be effective for the City in fiscal year 2023. The City will evaluate the potential impact on the City's net position.

GASB Statement No. 96, Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements (GASB 96):

This statement provides guidance on subscription-based information technology arrangements (SBITAs) to further report on government's obligations and assets from SBITAs. This statement will be effective for the City in fiscal year 2023. The City will evaluate the potential impact on the City's net position.

Statement No. 99, Omnibus 2022 (GASB 99):

This statement improves comparability and consistency of application of accounting and financial reporting and also authoritative literature. This statement will be effective for the City in fiscal year 2023. The City will evaluate the potential impact on the City's net position.

GASB Statement No. 100, Accounting Changes and Error Corrections—an amendment of GASB Statement No. 62 (GASB 100):

This statement improves the clarity and requirements for accounting changes and error corrections. This statement will be effective for the City in fiscal year 2024. The City will evaluate the potential impact on the City's net position.

GASB Statement No. 101, Compensated Absences (GASB 101):

This statement addresses the recognition and measurement of compensated absences. This statement will be effective for the City in fiscal year 2025. The City will evaluate the potential impact on the City's net position.

Note 2: Deposits and Investments

The deposit and investment policies of the City are governed by State Statutes and the adopted City Investment Policy. City policies governing bank deposits require depositories to be FDIC-insured institutions, and depositories must fully collateralize all deposits in excess of FDIC insurance limits.

Statutes authorize the City to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agency securities, repurchase agreements, and municipal pools.

The City utilizes a pooled investment concept for all its funds to maximize its investment program. Investment income from this internal pooling is allocated to the respective funds based upon the sources of funds invested.

During the year ended September 30, 2022, the City invested in Texas CLASS, TexPool, and LOGIC, which are investment pools authorized by the Texas Legislature.

Texas Cooperative Liquid Assets Securities System (Texas CLASS) was created specifically for the use of Texas local government entities and seeks to provide safety, liquidity, convenience, and competitive rates of return. Public Trust Advisors, LLC serves as the pool's administrator and investment adviser. The marketing and operation functions of the portfolio are also performed by Public Trust Advisors, LLC. The pool is subject to the general supervision of the Board of Trustees and its Advisory Board, both of which are elected by the Texas CLASS Participants.

Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. serves as custodian for the pool. The investment objective and strategy of the pool is to seek preservation of principal, liquidity, and current income through investment in a diversified portfolio of short-term marketable securities. The pool offers same day access to investment funds.

Texas CLASS attempts to minimize its exposure to market and credit risk through the use of various strategies and credit monitoring techniques. Texas CLASS limits its investments in any issuer to the top two ratings issued by nationally recognized statistical rating organizations. Texas CLASS is rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's.

The State Comptroller of Public Accounts exercises oversight responsibility over TexPool. Oversight includes the ability to significantly influence operations, designation of management, and accountability for fiscal matters. Additionally, the State Comptroller has established an Advisory Board composed both of participants in TexPool and of other persons who do not have a business relationship with TexPool. The Advisory Board members review the investment policy and management fee structure. Finally, TexPool is rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's. TexPool is not registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) as an investment company.

LOGIC was established pursuant to an Interlocal Agreement, which was subsequently amended and is now entitled Participation Agreement and Trust Instrument (Agreement) between participating Government Entities. Participation in the Pool is limited to those eligible Government Entities which have become parties to the Agreement (Participants). Participants' assets in the Pool are represented by units of beneficial interest (Units), which are issued in discrete series (each a "Portfolio"), as authorized from time to time by the Board. Assets invested in any Portfolio will be managed separately, and segregated from, the assets of every other Portfolio. Since September 2005, J.P. Morgan Investment Management Inc. (JPMIM) has served as investment adviser to LOGIC. FirstSouthwest, a Division of Hilltop Securities (FirstSouthwest) and JPMIM serve as co-administrators to LOGIC, and FirstSouthwest provides administrative, participant support and marketing services.

JPMorgan Chase Bank N.A. provides custodial services. The investment objective and strategy of the pool is to seek preservation of principal, liquidity, and current income through investment in a diversified portfolio of short-term marketable securities. The pool offers same day access to investment funds. LOGIC is rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's.

TexPool is carried at amortized cost. Texas CLASS and LOGIC are carried at net asset value. Accordingly, the fair value of the position in the pools is the same as the value of the pools shares.

Interest Rate Risk

The strategy of the City is to maintain sufficient liquidity in its portfolio and structure the investment portfolio so that securities mature to meet cash requirements for ongoing operations, thereby avoiding the need to sell securities in the secondary market prior to maturity.

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is the risk that a government will not be able to recover: (a) deposits if the depository financial institution fails or (b) the value of investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party if the counterparty to the investment or deposit transaction fails. To minimize such risk, the City requires collateralization of most deposits in excess of coverage, utilizes the delivery vs. payment method for investment purchases and contracts with a third-party safekeeping agent.

Credit Risk

It is the City's policy to follow statutes, which authorize the City to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury agencies and instrumentalities, obligations of the state of Texas and related agencies, obligations of states, agencies, counties, cities, and other political subdivisions of any state rated "A" or above by Standard & Poor's Corporation or Moody's, repurchase agreements and designated investment pools. The City's assets in investment pools meet this requirement as noted above.

Note 3: Disclosures About Fair Value of Assets

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1 Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- **Level 2** Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- **Level 3** Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

Certain investments that are measured using the net asset value per share (or its equivalent) practical expedient have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value amounts included above approximate net asset value for all related external investment pool balances.

Note 4: Property Taxes

Property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on property as of October 1. Taxes are levied on October 1, and are due and payable on or before January 31, of the following year. All unpaid taxes become delinquent February 1, of the following year. Tax collections for the year ended September 30, 2022, were 98.0 percent of the levy. Dallas County bills and collects property taxes for the City. Any uncollected property taxes at September 30, that are collected within 60 days is recognized as revenue and recorded as taxes receivable. Any uncollected property taxes at September 30, which are not expected to be collected within 60 days, are recorded as taxes receivable and deferred inflow of resources in governmental funds. Anticipated refunds of such taxes are recorded as liabilities and reductions of revenue when they are measurable, and their validity seems certain.

The statutes of the state of Texas do not prescribe a legal debt limit, nor does the City's charter provide for a debt limit. However, provision of Article XI, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution applicable to cities with populations greater than 5,000 limits the ad-valorem tax rate to \$2.50 per \$100 assessed valuation. However, as a city operating under a Home Rule Charter, the City has a debt limit of \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation. For the year ended September 30, 2022, the City had a tax rate of \$.6918 per \$100.00 assessed valuation, of which \$.5314 was allocated for general government and \$.1604 was allocated for the payment of principal and interest on general obligation debt.

In Texas, county-wide central appraisal districts are required to assess all property within the appraisal district on the basis of 100 percent of its appraised value and are prohibited from applying any assessment ratios. The value of property within the appraisal district must be reviewed every three years; however, the City may, at its own expense, require annual reviews of appraised values.

The City may challenge appraised values established by the appraisal district through various appeals and, if necessary, legal action. Under this legislation, the City continues to set tax rates on City property.

However, if the effective tax rate, excluding tax rates for bonds and other contractual obligations, adjusted for new improvements, exceeds the tax rate for the previous year by more than eight percent, qualified voters of the City may petition for an election to determine whether to limit the tax rate to no more than eight percent above the tax rate of the previous year. This legislation provides that, if approved by the qualified voters in the City, both the appraisal and collection functions may be placed with the appraisal district. In addition, the City may obtain approval from its governing body to place these functions with the appraisal district.

The interfund transfers to the General Fund from the Water and Sewer Fund, Golf Fund, Non-major Governmental, and Enterprise Funds represent those revenues that are transferred from one fund to another to recover administrative costs of the General Fund. This is sometimes referred to as indirect costs or overhead and are made to recognize and account for the fact that one fund incurs untraceable costs directly associated with another fund. The transfer ensures that each fund pays its fair share of the costs to operate that fund. A transfer is the preferred method to cover these costs and those associated with operating these funds.

Note 6: Lease Receivable

GASB No. 87 Leases - Included

The City leases a portion of its property to various businesses who use the space to conduct their operations, the terms of which expire in 2024. The measurement of the lease receivable is based on the present value of lease payments expected to be received during the lease term, such as fixed payments, variable payments that depend on an index or rate, variable payments that are fixed in substance, residual value guarantee payments that are fixed in substance, and any lease incentives payable to the lessee.

The City recognized \$2,250 in lease revenue and \$464 in lease interest during the current fiscal year related to these leases. As of September 30, 2022, the City receivable for lease payments was \$5,215. Also, the City has a deferred inflow of resources associated with these leases that will be recognized as revenue over the lease terms. As of September 30, 2022, the balance of the deferred inflow of resources was \$4,751.

GASB No. 87 Excluded Leases - Regulated

In accordance with GASB No. 87, the City does not recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources for regulated leases. Regulated leases are certain leases that are subject to external laws, regulations, or legal rulings, e.g. the Federal Aviation Administration, between airports and aeronautical users. Regulated leases include hanger buildings, space in the terminal building, as well as various land leases used for aeronautical purposes. The City recognized \$7,606 in lease revenue and \$198 in lease interest during the current fiscal year related to these leases.

General long-term debt consists of the following: financed purchases; liabilities for accrued vacation leave; general obligation bonds and certificates of obligation along with associated premiums, which are direct obligations; issued on the full faith and credit of the City. Principal and interest payments on the general obligation bonds and certificates of obligation are secured by advalorem taxes levied on all taxable property within the City, and surplus revenues of the Water and Sewer Fund and Airport Fund. A portion of the general obligation bonds has been issued on behalf of the Water and Sewer Fund. Although these bonds are secured by the full faith and credit of the City and have no specific claim against Water and Sewer Fund assets, debt service requirements are provided by the Water and Sewer Fund. Accordingly, this debt is reflected as an obligation of the Water and Sewer Fund.

For the governmental activities, compensated absences, net pension liabilities, and total OPEB liabilities are generally liquidated in the General Fund.

During the current fiscal year, the City refunded \$7,165,000 of governmental general obligation (GO) bonds by issuing \$7,315,000 in a taxable refunding issuance entitled GO Refunding Bonds, Series 2021. No additional proceeds were received, and the City paid \$57,837 in issuance costs and underwriter discounts from the Debt Service Fund. As a result of the taxable refunding, the City reduced its total debt service requirements by \$547,426, which resulted in an economic gain (difference between the present value of the debt service payments on the old and new debt) of approximately \$536,350.

Note 9: Employee Retirement System

Plan Description

The City provides pension benefits for all of its full-time employees through a nontraditional, joint contributory, hybrid defined benefit plan in the state-wide TMRS, an agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system. The plan provisions that have been adopted by the City are within options available in the governing state statutes of TMRS. Lancaster Economic Development Corporation and Lancaster Recreational Development Corporation contribute to the plan with a cost share of 0.98 percent and 4.37 percent, respectively. There were no significant changes in the component unit's proportion to the plan during fiscal year 2022.

TMRS issues a publicly available comprehensive financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information (RSI) for TMRS; the report also provides detailed explanations of the contributions, benefits and actuarial methods and assumptions used by the system. This report may be obtained by writing to Texas Municipal Retirement System, P.O. Box 149153, Austin, Texas, 78714-9153 or by calling 800-924-8677; in addition, the report is available on TMRS' website at www.TMRS.com.

Contributions

Under the state law governing TMRS, the contribution rate for each city is determined annually by the actuary, using the entry age normal actuarial cost method. This rate consists of the normal cost contribution rate and the prior service contribution rate, which is calculated to be a level percent of payroll from year to year. The normal cost contribution rate finances the portion of an active member's projected benefit allocated annually; the prior service contribution rate amortizes the unfunded actuarial liability over the applicable period for that city. Both the normal cost and prior service contribution rates include recognition of the projected impact of annually repeating benefits, such as Updated Service Credits and Annuity Increases.

The City's contributions to TMRS for the year ended September 30, 2022, were \$2,675,859, and were equal to the required contributions.

The City contributes to the TMRS plan at an actuarially determined rate. Both the employees and the City make contributions monthly. Since the City needs to know its contribution rate in advance for budgetary purposes, there is a one-year delay between the actuarial valuation that serves as the basis for the rate and the calendar year when the rate goes into effect (*i.e.*, December 31, 2012, valuation is effective for the rates beginning January 1, 2014).

Net Pension Liability

Actuarial Assumptions

The total pension liability in the December 31, 2021, actuarial valuation was determined using the following actuarial assumptions:

Inflation 2.5% per year

Overall payroll growth 2.55%, including inflation

Investment rate of return 6.75% net of pension plan investment expense, including inflation

Salary increases were based on a service-related table. Mortality rates for active members are based on the PUB (10) mortality tables with the Public Safety table used for males and the General Employee table used for females. Mortality rates for healthy retirees and beneficiaries were based on the gender-distinct 2019 Municipal Retirees of Texas mortality tables. The rates for actives, health retirees, and beneficiaries are projected on a fully generational basis by Scale UMP to account for future mortality improvements. For disabled annuitants, the same mortality tables for healthy retirees is used with a 4-year set forward for males and a 3-year set forward for females. In addition, a 3.5 percent and 3.0 percent minimum mortality rate is applied, for males and females respectively, to reflect the impairment for younger members who become disabled. The rates are projected on a fully generational basis by Scale UMP to account for future mortality improvements subject to the floor.

The actuarial assumptions were developed primarily from the actuarial investigation of the experience of TMRS over the four-year period from December 31, 2014 to December 31, 2018. They were adopted in 2019 and first used in the December 31, 2019 actuarial valuation. The post-retirement mortality assumption for Annuity Purchase Rates (APRs) is based on the Mortality Experience Investigation Study. Plan assets are managed on a total return basis with an emphasis on both capital appreciation as well as the production of income. In order to satisfy the short-term and long-term funding needs of TMRS. The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments is 6.75 percent. The pension plan's policy in regard to the allocation of invested assets is established and may be amended by the TMRS Board of Trustees. Plan assets are managed on a total return basis with an emphasis on both capital appreciation as well as the production of income, in order to satisfy the short-term and long-term funding needs of TMRS.

The long-term expected rate of return in pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense, and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. In determining their best estimate of a recommended investment return assumption under the various alternative asset allocation portfolios, the actuary focused on the area between: (1) arithmetic mean (aggressive) without an adjustment for time (conservative) and (2) the geometric mean (conservative) with an adjustment for time (aggressive). The target allocation and best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 6.75 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employee contributions will remain at the current 6.75 percent and employer contributions will be made at the rates specified in statute. Based on that assumption, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current active and inactive employees. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Note 10: Other Postemployment Benefits

Retiree Health Care Plan

Plan Description

The City provides post-employment medical care (OPEB) for employees through a single-employer defined benefit medical plan. The plan provides medical benefits for eligible retirees, their spouses, and dependents through the City's group health insurance plans, which cover both active and retired members. The benefit levels and contribution rates are approved annually by the City management and the City Council as part of the budget process.

Since no assets are accumulated in a trust that meets the criteria of paragraph four of GASB 75, the plan is not accounted for as a trust fund. The plan does not issue a separate financial report.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements September 30, 2022

Benefits Provided

The City provides post-employment medical and dental care benefits to its retirees. Retirees who elect COBRA cannot later elect retiree coverage. To be eligible for coverage an employee must qualify under all three of the following:

- 1. The retiree must have been covered for medical benefits under the City Health Plan as an employee immediately prior to termination of employment.
- 2. Apply for pension benefits from TMRS in accordance with their requirements and deadlines, but in no event later than 90 days from termination of employment; and
- 3. Enroll for retiree Health coverage within 31 days of the date of termination.

Funding Policy

The plan's premium rates are determined annually by City management and approved by the City Council as part of the annual budget. Members receiving HMO medical benefits contribute \$672 per month for retiree-only coverage, \$1,480 per month for retiree and spouse, and \$2,290 per month for retiree and family. Members receiving PPO medical benefits contribute \$822 per month for retiree-only coverage, \$1,808 per month for retiree and spouse, and \$2,798 per month for retiree and family. By the City not contributing anything toward this plan in advance, the City employs a pay-as-you-go method through ensuring the annual employer contributions each year are equal to the benefits that are paid on behalf of the retirees.

Supplemental Death Benefit Fund

Plan Description

The City also participates in the single-employer defined benefit OPEB plan providing group term life insurance which is operated by TMRS and is known as the Supplemental Death Benefits fund (SDBF). The City elected, by ordinance, to provide group term life insurance coverage to active and retired members. The City may terminate coverage under and discontinue participation in the SDBF by adopting an ordinance before November 1, of any year to be effective the following January 1.

Benefits Provided

The death benefit for active employees provides a lump-sum payment approximately equal to the employee's annual salary (calculated based on the employee's actual earnings, for the 12-month period preceding the month of death); retired employees are insured for \$7,500; this coverage is an "other post-employment benefit" or OPEB.

The City contributes to the SDBF at a contractually required rate as determined by an annual actuarial valuation. This rate is equal to the cost of providing one-year term life insurance. The funding policy for the SDBF program is to assure that adequate resources are available to meet all death benefit payments for the upcoming year; the intent is not to prefund retiree life insurance during employees' entire careers. No assets are accumulated in a trust that meets the criteria in paragraph four of GASB 75.

The TMRS SDBF is treated as unfunded OPEB plan because the SDBF trust covers both actives and retirees, and the assets are not accumulated in a trust that meets the criteria of paragraph four of GASB 75. Under GASB 75 (paragraph 155), the discount rate for an unfunded OPEB plan should be based on 20-year tax-exempt AA or higher Municipal Bonds. Therefore, a discount rate of 1.84 percent based on the 20-Year Municipal GO AA Index published by bondbuyer.com is used as of the measurement date of December 31, 2021. At transition, GASB 75 also requires that the Total OPEB Liability (TOL) as of the prior fiscal year end be estimated based on the 20-Year Bond GO Index.

Note 11: 457(b) Retirement Plans

The City offers all employees an opportunity to participate in two deferred compensation plans that have been established in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457. These plans are 457(b) plans, and one is administered by ICMA, and one is administered by Nationwide. The Plans provisions and contribution requirements are established and may be amended by plan administrator. Vantage Trust Company is the trustee of the ICMA plan and Nationwide is the trustee of its plan. Employees may enroll in the plans and/or change their contribution amounts at any time. The City does not contribute to either plan.

Note 12: Litigation

The City is party to several legal actions arising in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of the City's legal counsel and management, the City has adequate legal defense and/or insurance coverage regarding each of these actions and does not believe the amount is probable.

Note 13: Commitments and Contingencies

Risk Management

The City is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The City is part of the Texas Municipal League Intergovernmental Risk Pool (Pool). Premiums are paid to the Pool, which retain a limit of loss. Reinsurance companies insure the risks beyond those limits. The City retains, as a risk, only the deductible amount of each policy. There were no significant reductions in coverage in the past fiscal year and there were no settlements exceeding insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Trinity River Authority of Texas

The City contracts with Trinity River Authority of Texas (TRA), a conservation and reclamation district, whereby TRA finances, constructs, operates and maintains sewage transportation and treatment facilities for the benefit of the City. The current contract is extended through the date until which all bonds have been paid. The City makes payments monthly, which are based on an estimate of its share of costs. The City's share of costs for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2022, was \$6,876,688 for the Ten Mile Creek Regional Wastewater System and \$157,677, for the Red Oak Creek Regional Wastewater System. This estimate is calculated by TRA who makes adjustments for over/under charges in the City's next fiscal year. There were no adjustments to the amounts as calculated by the TRA for the year ended September 30, 2022.

Federal and State Programs

The City participates in several federal and state grant programs, which are governed by various rules and regulations of the grantor agencies. Costs charged to the respective grant programs are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor agencies; therefore, to the extent that if the City has not complied with the rules and regulations governing the grants, refunds of any money received may be required and the collectability of any related receivable at September 30, 2022, may be impaired.

Other Contingencies

There are other claims and pending actions incidental to normal operations of the City. In the opinion of the City administration, the City's potential liability in these matters will not have a material impact in the accompanying financial statements.



Note 14: Tax Incentive Rebates

The City of Lancaster has active Commercial Development and Job Related Incentive Rebates that develop or redevelop a particular property attracting business that generates incremental tax revenues. In addition to GASB 77, the agreements are subject to Chapter 380 of the Texas Local Government Code that promotes local economic development, commercial activity and business stimulation. City Council approves the agreements via resolution. As part of the agreement, the City agrees to rebate the tax valorem tax increment and the local sales tax after confirmation of payment. If the businesses do not meet the obligations as set forth in the agreement, a clawback provision for default on agreement is included in the agreement and the business agrees to return a percentage of the rebate back to the City. Total rebate of property tax dollars paid out of the general fund for the year ended September 30, 2022 is \$2,533,785.

The City also uses Sales Tax Incentive Programs to spur additional economic development. For the year ended September 30, 2022, sales tax rebates paid out of LEDC was \$180,000.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The City adopts an "appropriated budget" of the General Fund on the modified accrual basis of accounting by department. The City is required to present the adopted and final amended budgeted revenues and expenditures. The City compares the final amended budget to actual revenues and expenditures.

Encumbrances are commitments related to unperformed (executory) contracts for goods or services (i.e., purchase orders, contracts, and commitments). Encumbrance accounting is utilized to the extent necessary to assure effective budgetary control and accountability and to facilitate effective cash planning and control. While all appropriations and encumbrances technically lapse at year end, valid outstanding encumbrances (those for which performance under the executory contract is expected in the next year) are reappropriated and spent in the subsequent year. The variances between General Fund - Budget and Actual Schedule, as noted on the previous page, are a result of prior year encumbrances and not expenditures in excess of current year appropriations.

An operating budget for the General Fund is legally adopted each fiscal year.

The budget is adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP).

The City generally follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- 1. A proposed operating budget including proposed expenditures and the means of financing them is submitted to the City Council by the City Manager.
- 2. Upon receipt of the budget estimates, the City Council holds a first reading on the Budget Ordinance and Tax Roll Ordinance. Information about the Budget Ordinance is then published in the official newspaper of the City.
- 3. A public hearing on the budget is held.
- 4. Prior to October 1 the budget is legally enacted through passage of an ordinance. The legal level of budgetary control is at the fund level. The City Manager is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; however, any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the City Council. Budgetary control has been established at the detail level by line item activity for management control.

Special Revenue Funds

Special revenue funds are used to account for specific revenues that are legally restricted to expenditure for particular purposes.

Stormwater Drainage Fund – to account for revenues received from a fee charged for the development of the City's storm sewer drainage system.

Public Improvement Districts Fund – to account for the activities of the public improvement districts of the City.

Police State Seized Fund – to account for the activities of related funds awarded to the City by the Courts.

Police Federal Seized Fund – to account for the activities of related funds awarded to the City by the Courts.

Hotel/Motel Fund – to account for the revenues received from a hotel and motel tax.

Emergency 911 Fund – to account for revenues received from a fee charged for emergency services.

Parkland Dedication Fund – to account for revenues to provide for parks, open spaces and recreational areas.

Capital Projects Fund

Street Maintenance Fund – to account for maintenance of the City's transportation system.


